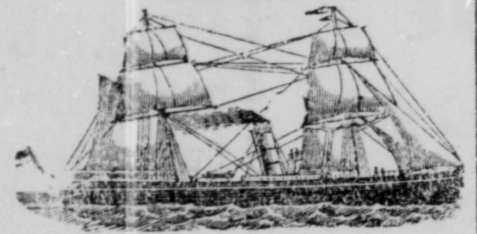

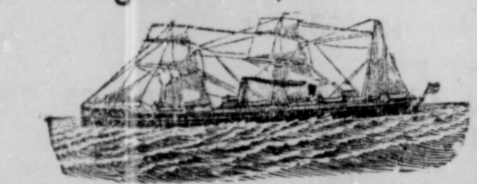

The Transvaal War

British at the Cape.

The situation on the western frontiers of the Transvaal and the Orange Free State is as follows, taking the point in their order at their relative greatest distance from Capetown:

This makes the grand total of the men available on the Cape Colony side 14,786 men, before the arrival of Gen Buller's forces.

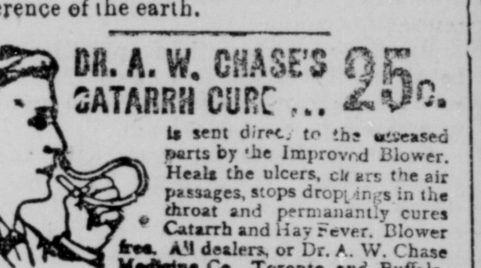
