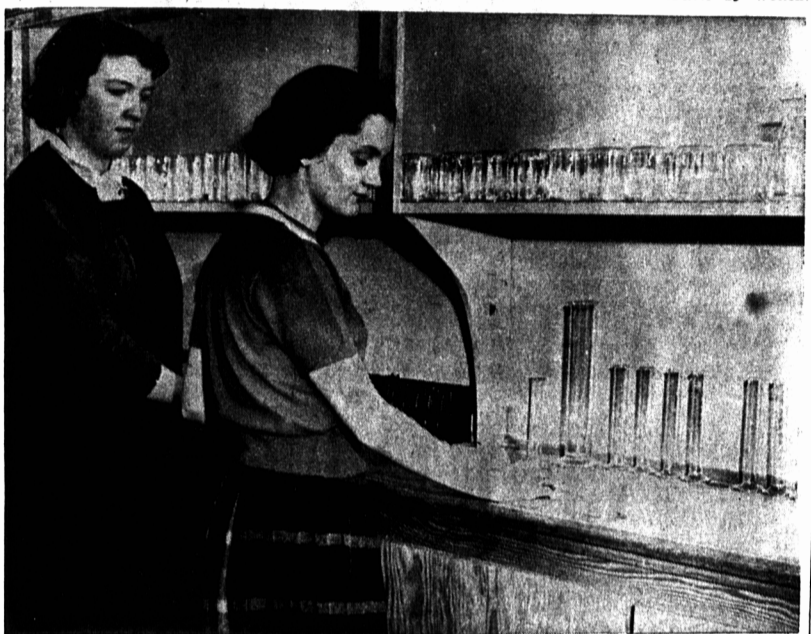

Debate Ice Equipment For Civic Stadium At S'ide

Sharp division on the type of ice-making equipment being installed in the Summerside Stadium highlighted a special meeting of the Summerside Town Council last evening with some 50 citizens present to hear the Mayor and Councillors express their opinions on the matter, and to hear an explanation concerning the operation of the equipment by an engineer of the company which is installing the plant.

The council, at this meeting, gave approval to the remaining of the rink which will now be officially known as the "Civic Stadium", and, in view of the fact that the town is desirous of having this building designated as a civic building and recreational centre, it will be designated as "The Sport Centre for Prince County".

The council also gave unanimous approval to installation and repairs to be made on the "Civic Stadium" which will include the installation of toilet facilities in the dressing rooms and office; enlarging of dressing rooms and ceiling; insulating the ceiling in the main entrance lobby; provision of a check room; preparation of freezing plant room by cement or cement block partition and base for compressor; installation of fans for freezing plant room in accordance with specifications; painting of dressing rooms; office, bleachers, promenade, and check room; provision of melting vat for ice scrapings; installation of four ventilators in the room; repairs to main entrance doors; enlarging the entrance gates to ice, and to the penalty box and time keepers at the ends of the rink.

With the exception of Councillor James MacDougall, who is ill in hospital, all the Councillors were present at the meeting which was presided over by Mayor Henry Wedge who opened the discussion by saying that the meeting, apart from the two resolutions dealing with repairs to, and the renaming of the stadium, had been called to publicly discuss the pros and cons of the ice plant recently purchased by the Town Council, and he announced that Mr. A. F. Mavety, a representative of the Creamery Package Co. Ltd. of Toronto to whom the contract had been awarded, was present to answer questions and explain details of the system being installed.

He said that Mr. Mavety had specialized in the study of refrigeration, and that many improvements had been made in the refrigeration field by the research engineers of the company with which he was associated.

LIVELY DISCUSSION
In the lively discussion which followed, Councillors Wm. Jenkins, of Donald Lidstone and Andrew Perry expressed their opposition to the direct expansion type of plant which uses ammonia throughout, the system which is being installed at Summerside. They favored instead, one that carried brine in the pipes under the ice surface.

Mayor Wedge and Councillors Clarence Steele and Dr. Hillard Clark spoke in support of the type of plant which has been purchased.

In expressing his opposition Councillor Jenkins said he did so because of an experience he had had with the liquid ammonia in a freezing plant which he owned.

Councillor Steele in support of the system purchased, said that in many meetings held by the council in reaching a decision on the matter they had interviewed representatives from five different companies supplying freezing plants, and had contacted several rinks, using the type purchased by Summerside and had learned that they were fully satisfactory.

He named 28 rinks which, among those using the type being installed in Summerside, and included in these were rinks at Saint John, St. Andrews and Truro.

Councillor Clark reviewed briefly the events leading up to the awarding of the contract which was the council's bare quorum of if opposing members of the council had attended the council meeting when the contract was made, it would not have been necessary to have held the meeting then in progress.

He said that councillors who had attended the meetings with the engineers used liquid ammonia in their compressing systems, but that instead of using brine in the pipes under the ice surface, which was being installed in the stadium had the ammonia. While high pressure in the engine room was used in both systems the pressure of the ammonia was reduced to 30-35 pounds under the ice surface in pipes which were tested to 100 lbs.

He went on to explain that if the 30 to 35 pounds pressure should for some reason increase there were safety devices provided to permit the system to discharge the ammonia gas safely so that no harm would be done. He said that a small leak in a pipe under the ice would take about two days to come through the ice, and even then it might be necessary to kneel down on the ice to the spot in order to detect it.

He said that even if the pipe split there would be two to three inches of ice which would absorb the ammonia which is soluble in water, and that in the event of a leak every rink was equipped with a hose with which to flood the rink so as to make the danger negligible.

Councillor Jenkins inquired whether Mr. Mavety's company would guarantee that there is no hazard when liquid ammonia is used under the ice surface, and whether they had a service man east of Montreal.

Mayor Wedge suggested that the question was unfair in making a comparison between companies in view of the fact that that question had never been asked of the other companies by the council.

In reply to the second question Mr. Mavety said that a service man could be provided from Saint John.

EXPLANATIONS
Councillor Jenkins then asked the Town Clerk to read two letters he had received, one from T. W. Cope, representing Frigate Equipment Ltd., from Gunningville, N.B., the other being from John A. Kennedy Co., Ltd., Saint John, N.B.

Both of these letters expressed criticism of the type of system being installed at Summerside, and emphasizing the danger involved in the use of liquid ammonia.

In reply Mr. Mavety said that the manufacturers of the equipment sold by the companies, represented by the two letters were both installing direct expansion equipment in rinks in Upper Canada.

Councillor Lidstone, speaking against the type being installed at Summerside referred to an accident in a Cape Breton rink recently in which two men were injured from ammonia.

Mr. Mavety pointed out that this particular rink referred to by Councillor Lidstone was equipped with the brine system which Councillor Lidstone favored, and he pointed out that this accident occurred in the engine room where ammonia is the refrigerant in both systems.

Councillor Lidstone read a letter from the Deputy Minister of Health in which it was stated that the Department is aware of the danger of ammonia gas, and which said there were no regulations regarding its use in rinks in this Province.

Councillor Perry expressed his fear of the use of ammonia in the rink system, and said that he personally favored the brine system. He inquired how much it would cost at this point to change the system to the brine which would be used under the ice surface instead of the ammonia, and one

MAYOR SUMS UP

Summing up Mayor Wedge said that it has not been shown that a hazard has existed as a result of a break anywhere where this type of system is used, and since no proof has been presented to show that such a break ever occurred which would result in a public hazard, it cannot be stated definitely that a hazard exists in this circuitous ammonia plant anymore than such a hazard would exist in any other type of plant.

He said that in view of this, and because the Creamery Package Company has advised the council that this plant is so constructed and tested as to guard against such a hazard if a leak or break should occur; and since nothing definite has been proven to condemn the ammonia circulation system, and since all members of the council were duly notified of the date and hour that a meeting would be held to consider tenders received for the necessary quorum were present to conduct the business of the agenda that it is now reasonable to say that objections are now out of order.

He said the citizens should realize that the council is conscious of the amount of money put into this rink and would certainly not install a system which in their minds was going to be detrimental to the public.

Even if no money were spent by the town, he said, the council would still consider this matter as being their responsibility if some one else were installing this or any other system in the rink, and would make sure of the safety to the public, and he concluded by saying that "this is exactly what has been done in deciding on the type of plant purchased."

Appointment Announced By Dalhousie Univ.

The development of a centre for the study and treatment of virus diseases in Halifax which will be second no one in the country was forecast by Dr. A. E. Kerr of Dalhousie University today in commenting on the appointment to the University's Department of Bacteriology and to the Provincial Laboratories of Dr. C. E. Van Rooyen.

Dr. van Rooyen's appointment as professor of Bacteriology at Dalhousie and as Associate Director, Division of Laboratories, Department of Public Health, was announced jointly by Dr. Kerr and the Hon. Geoffrey Stevens, Minister of Public Health.

"This is another in a series of appointments which hold great significance for the Provincial Health authorities and for Dalhousie's medical school, whose work is so closely integrated," said Dr. Kerr. "Shortly after the war, Dr. van Rooyen was appointed Professor of Virus Diseases at the School of Hygiene, University of Toronto, and research Member of the Connaught Research Laboratories. He was at this time recognized as one of the outstanding virologists of the English-speaking world.

"During the past nine years in Toronto, Dr. van Rooyen and his associates have contributed extensively to medical knowledge concerning virus diseases. The story of the Canadian contribution to the development of a poliomyelitis vaccine is well known and Dr. van Rooyen and his staff were primarily responsible for that contribution. His experience and demonstrated ability in this field will be of the greatest value to the program of teaching, research, and treatment in this area.

Dr. van Rooyen is a native of Scotland and a graduate of the University of Edinburgh. After a distinguished undergraduate record, graduated in 1931 with the degree of M.B. Ch. B. In 1934, he was awarded the degree of M.D., which in Scotland is an honorary post-graduate degree, with high commendation for a research thesis concerning virus diseases.

He continued his postgraduate studies in Bacteriology and in the newly developing field of Virology, and, in 1941, was awarded the degree of D. Sc. by Edinburgh for a research thesis on virus diseases. Part of this special training was taken at the University of Hamburg, Germany, in 1934 and at St. Bartholomew's Hospital, London, in 1933 and 1935.

From 1939 to 1945, Dr. van Rooyen served with the Royal Army Medical Corps, having a distinguished and colorful record. He was Officer in Charge of the Pathological Laboratory of No. 1 General Hospital of the B.E.F. in France in 1940, landing at Dieppe, and in 1941, was awarded the degree of D. Sc. by Edinburgh for a research thesis on virus diseases. He was then posted in charge of the
