Highway Safety Is Subject Of Talk To Junior Farmers

NEW GLASGOW — Highway safety was the theme of a talk given by Cpl. Eric Tidford to members of the New Glasgow and District Junior Farmers group at the Recreation Centre here last week.
Cpl. Tidford is NCO in charge of the Highway Traffic branch of the RCMP "L" Division.

He pointed out to the 32 young people in attendance that the purpose of the RCMP was to protect the public. They do this by enforcing the laws and laws are never unreasonable.
Behind each law he said is a great deal of investigation.
He pointed out that "driving is a full time job" and said close driving and inattentive driving are two main causes of traffic accidents.

Drinking drivers too often are the cause of accidents he said and a driver is considered "impaired" no matter how small a quantity of liquor he has consumed.
He said the impaired driver has his sight affected, his reflexes slowed, his thinking clouded and is inclined to be fearless and careless under the influence of alcohol.

80 PER CENT CAREFUL
Cpl. Tidford pointed out that about 80 per cent of drivers are careful and never appear in court on traffic charges. The remaining 20 per cent, he said, don't won't or can't comply with regulations.
Safe driving he said will save lives, needless suffering, loss of work and permanent disability. It would result in lower insurance rates and lessen expensive police control.

He said there were 500 accidents reported on the Island during the first 11 months this year with damage averaging over \$100 per accident. There were 24 fatalities and 300 people underwent hospital care.
The RCMP, he said, has as its goal an accident free future. This goal could be reached if everyone would co-operate.
The guest speaker was introduced and thanked by Robert Rackham President Rolly Larkin presided.
Following his talk Cpl. Tidford answered many questions pertaining to traffic safety.

Two persons were fatal accident victims in Prince Edward Island this past weekend.
A nine-year-old girl died yesterday morning in the Charlottetown Hospital from injuries she received Sunday evening when struck by a car on Upper Prince Street. She was the 27th victim of a highway or street fatal accident in Prince Edward Island this year.
A Summerside woman, Mrs. Heath Warren, wife of the town's fire chief, succumbed to third degree burns which she received in an accident at home.
No inquest is slated to be held into the Summerside fatality but an inquiry will be held into the death of Mary Bertha Melsaac of Mermaid, who was the victim of the street accident in Charlottetown.
A jury was empanelled yesterday by Coroner Dr. C. A. Coady and viewed the body. The inquest hearing is scheduled for Saturday afternoon at 1 o'clock in the city court room.
Members of the jury are Wendell Beaton, foreman; Clark Innis, John MacLure, Frank MacDonald, Frank Vanderstine, Sidney Stead and Roy MacGillivray. The little girl is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leo P. Melsaac, of Mermaid.
Besides her parents, she is survived by two sisters, Anita Marie and Leona, and four brothers, Allan, Paul, Ian and Kevin.

Larger Administration Units Urged At Souris Public Meet

SOURIS — The desirability and necessity of larger units of administration in the field of education was outlined to a large gathering of area residents here last week at St. Mary's Hall by Rev. Edmond J. Roche, registrar of St. Dunstan's University.
Father Roche explained to the gathering what is meant by larger administration unit and said there was a special need for such an organization on the Island.
He said such an organization would primarily benefit grade 9-12 students. He said problems involved included, among other things, representation, organization and transportation. Most of these vary with districts.
ADVANTAGES
The advantages of larger units outweigh the disadvantages he said. He said nothing but the best is good enough for the children of the future.
He said the biggest advantage is giving the children in rural areas the opportunity of a high school education equal to that of students in urban areas. He said not only would material advantages be obtained but there would be great social advantages as well.
He said a larger unit of administration would mean districts would unite and share equally in the cost of supporting high school facilities. It would eliminate the inequality of tax payments and offer equal opportunity for all, primarily on the high school level.
Following the address a much discussion took place on the subject indicating a strong interest on the part of those present.
