

Found Dead.

At half-past eight o'clock this morning it was reported at the Police Station that a man was lying dead in a shed on Lord's Wharf. Two of the police immediately proceeded to the wharf, and in the upper flat of a block shop occupied by Mr. James Peebles they found the man as reported. The apartment in which the body was found is a wretched, gloomy, filthy hole, having marks of everything but what would be the shadow of comfort to a poor human. The bed on which he was lying is constructed on the floor by a board about a foot and a half wide, supported by a tobacco box and a small log. A bag of hay covered with a door mat was used as a mattress; a filthy quilt and a few old coats as a covering; and a small box covered with rags as a pillow. At the side of the bed there were an empty ale bottle, a lamp, and a fig of tobacco. The floor of the apartment was covered with filth, and the surroundings of the corpse presented a very sickening appearance. There were only a shirt and pants on the body when found by the police. It was lying backwards across the bed, with the head touching the floor on the left side. The arms were thrown upwards. Blood was flowing from the nose, and the floor, at the side of the bed, was thickly covered with traces of blood and vomit. The body was pale, the upper part of the face black; but no traces of violence were visible. It was that of a blacksmith named James Haywood, who belongs to Massachusetts, and arrived in this city in the spring of 1877. Since his arrival he has drunk very hard; ate very little; and has slept, during the last winter, in Mr. Peebles' shop, which, is by no means, the most comfortable. It is the opinion of the Coroner that he came to his death by congestion of the brain, caused by a rush of blood to the head, and vomiting while lying with his head downwards.

An inquest was held on view of the body before Dr. Jenkins at 10 o'clock this morning. The only witness examined was Mr. James Peebles with whom the deceased had been working. He deposed that the deceased ceased working on Monday. He was then complaining of being sick inwardly. I think he had a cold. He slept in the workshop previous to Wednesday, at which time he moved his bed up-stairs. Last night when I left him, he was a little easier than before. I gave him a bottle of ale yesterday morning. He had half of it when I left him last night. He could not leave the shop after I did. I came to the shop at 8 o'clock this morning. I called him, but got no answer. I went up stairs and found him dead. He was in the American war for four years. He was in the habit of drinking freely. He is an American citizen.

The jury returned a verdict that the deceased came to his death by natural causes.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

(Special Despatch to Examiner.)

LONDON, May 17.

A despatch from St. Petersburg says that it is believed that Schoubaloff has succeeded in convincing the Emperor that it is to Russia's interest to concede to Europe the most of the demands formulated by England.

The assembling of the Congress appears consequently assured, despite the difficulties which have arisen at Constantinople concerning the surrender of fortresses.

The Russian military authorities have forbidden the Bessarabian Deputies in the Roumanian Parliament to attend any more sittings of that Assembly.

BELGRADE, May 17.

A further misunderstanding has arisen between Prince Milan and the Ministry, respecting the Tripole revolt.

The Prince will not admit the competency of the military tribunal to pass sentence on civilians such as ex Minister Thumilek; but the Cabinet intends to resign if Prince Milan persists.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 17.

The examination of Suleiman Pasha has ended and judgment will be given soon.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 17.

The Russian journals, to-day, generally express hopes of peace; even those hitherto warlike have adopted a temperate tone.

LONDON, May 18.

The Paris correspondent of the Daily News telegraphs on Thursday night that this is the last day of grace, after many postponements, accorded exhibitors to be quite ready. France and the United States were long ago complete. The South American States have been working all day to make up for lost time.
