Jottings from the Old Country.

PARLIAMENTARY.
Extraordinary excitement marked the proceedings in the House of Commons on Monday, and indeed more than once honorable members suffered their enthusiasm to carry them beyond what is generally held to be the decorum of debate. Hour after hour Mr. Gladstone, Mr. Bright, and other Ministers, sat passive auditors of a tempest which it seemed impossible to allay. Almost as soon as the doors were opened, the House filled with expectant members, many of whom could not find seats in the body of the Chamber, and were fain to put up with accommodation in the side galleries. The places allotted to peers, to distinguished strangers, and to the ordinary public, had no inch of space unoccupied, and not even the dinner hour could materially thin the attendance.
In the House of Lords, Lord Oranmore and Browne called attention to the appointment of the Marquis of Ripon to the office of Governor-General of India, and the inconsistency of such appointment with the views expressed by the Prime Minister in his pamphlet published in 1875, entitled "Rome and Newest Fashions in Religion." Earl Grenville said the Government believed the noble Marquis was the person best fitted for the post. It was impossible that Lord Ripon could use his influence against the Protestant religion.
In the House of Commons, replying to Mr. Macartney, Mr. Gladstone said he knew nothing of the rumor that the Marquis of Ripon was a Jesuit, and, with great respect to the hon. member, he suggested that mere rumors, mentioned without any evidence or authority, were perhaps hardly a sufficient basis for a question. (Ministerial cheers.) As, however, the question was to be asked, it was, of course, his duty to make inquiry into the subject, and he was informed, as he certainly anticipated, that the noble Lord was not a member of the order stated—(renewed cheers)—and that it was impossible he should be, as he did not possess the necessary qualifications. (Cheers and laughter.)
Just on the stroke of midnight progress was reported, and the House resuming, the Home Secretary proceeded to move for leave to bring in a bill for the better protection of occupiers of land against injury to their crops from hares and rabbits, of which, pending his re-election, Mr. Gladstone had given notice. The principle of the bill simply is that every occupier of land is to have the right, by himself or by persons duly authorized by him, to destroy the ground game on his land, all contracts to the contrary to be void in law, and the right to be enjoyed concurrently with his landlord. This, he explained, was in the main the proposal made by Mr. Clare Read, when giving evidence before the Committee of 1872 as the mouthpiece of the Royal Chamber of Agriculture.
After a brief discussion leave was given to introduce the bill, and the remaining orders disposed of, the House adjourned.

IRELAND.
OUTRAGE.—Patrick Egan, bailiff to M. G. J. Robinson, of Roundstone, on Wednesday served an ejection on four tenants, who were in Claremorris at market. Two hours later, while in a public house, he was struck with some sharp instrument, inflicting a severe wound across his forehead, and his life is despaired of.

THE LORD LIEUTENANT.—The new Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, Earl Cowper, made his public entry into Dublin on Thursday. He was accompanied by the Countess, and having been met at Kingstown by his suite, a brilliant procession was formed, and proceeded from the Dublin railway terminus to the Castle. The weather was fine during the progress in the open air, and the distinguished arrivals were warmly received by the thousands of spectators who thronged the thoroughfares.

"TROOPING THE COLOUR" ON THE QUEEN'S BIRTHDAY.—On the Horse Guards' Parade the imposing military ceremony of "trooping the colour"—not the "colours," as most of our contemporaries year after year persist in designating it—attracted many thousands of spectators, who not only took up every inch of ground on the historic parade, crowned the housetops, the Admiralty, and the new public offices; but even within the sacred inner line of sentries, admittance to which was only supposed to be gained by the privileged holders of white tickets, stood shoulder to shoulder thirteen deep. Upon no previous occasion, according to the testimony of old soldiers who have witnessed the event for the last fifty years, has such an immense number of persons been crowded in so limited a space. There were many and sufficient reasons for this. The British public above all things dearly love military display. The occasions are so few and far between in the metropolis—thus in remarkable contrast to the other side of the Channel—that a brief mention through the ordinary sources never fails to produce the attendance of thousands, and as there was a most attractive programme shadowed forth, including the anticipated presence of nearly all the members of the royal family and the foreign princes and princesses now making a brief stay here, nothing more was desired than fine weather, which, it is needless to say, prevailed, the sun shining in a beautifully clear sky, its rays tempered by a gentle breeze. Before nine o'clock the sentries had taken up their positions. Half an hour later all the regiments, or detachment of the three regiments of the brigade of Foot Guards, arrived on the ground, followed by a squad of the 1st Life Guards, and were formed in three sides of a square, the colour party, furnished from the Coldstreams, on the right, extending to the "long gun," the line proper immediately fronting the Horse Guards, and the left of the square filled up with the massed bands of the Brigade and the cavalry in their gorgeous uniforms of scarlet and gold. General E. S. Burnaby, late Colonel of the Grenadier Guards, in which regiment this distinguished officer has served for thirty-seven years, was in command of the parade, which was called to attention when the Princess of Wales, with her children, drove across to the Commander-in-Chief's rooms, where she instantly became the observed of all observers, and at a quarter past ten the Commander-in-Chief (in the uniform of the Guards) rode on to the ground accompanied by the Prince of Wales, the Duke of Connaught, the Duke of Edinburgh, the Duke of Teck, and a large and brilliant staff. The Her Apparent wore the uniform of the Hon. Artillery Company, of which he is captain general and honorary colonel; the Duke of Edinburgh the blue with silver ornaments of a volunteer artillery corps; the Duke of Connaught that of the Rifle Brigade of which he is soon to vacate the command; and the Duke of Teck the sombre, but neat and serviceable, dark grey of the Post Office Rifle Corps, of which he is so energetic and able an officer. The foreign princes and attaches were principally conspicuous by their picturesque uniforms, and in a few cases by the miserable-looking animals on which they were mounted. When the party reached the saluting base, the royal salute was given, the massed bands playing the National Anthem, and after an inspection of the troops the march past followed, and the color was duly trooped with military precision and perfection of marching, dressing and music. The escort was furnished by Lieut. J. Gladstone's company of the Coldstreams, the post of honor with the color being filled by Lieut. Douglas-Dawson, of the same regiment. The display was concluded shortly after eleven, with an advance in review order and royal salute.
