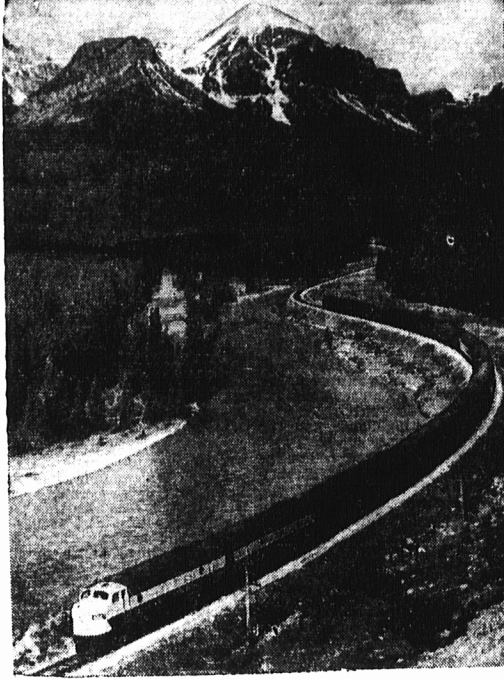

1,200 Girl Guides Go Under Canvas Near Ottawa

CONNAUGHT RIFLE RANGES, South March, Ont., July 13—(CP)—Some 1,200 happy teen-aged Girl Guides from most parts of Canada tomorrow will take over this site 15 miles southwest of Ottawa which normally is used for male rifle competitions.

The girls will spend 12 days under canvas at this camp, largest ever undertaken by the Girl Guides Association.

The Guides, ranging in age from 13 to 16, were hand-picked by the Girl Guides Association on the basis of individual merit and previous camping experience.

The camp was designed to help the youngsters to think as Canadians, not as the natives of any particular province.

They will be assembled in Provinces, each Province having a number of Guides based on the number of members of the movement in the Province.

After the opening ceremonies, the visitors will be asked to inspect some demonstrations of Guiding which will be done by a number of the campers.

Plans for the camp were started two years ago by the national executive of the Girl Guides Association.

The girls will pay their own way and will have a staff of some 300 volunteers to oversee activities.

The fee will be \$60 no matter from what part of the country the Guides come.

Truman Says US Trade Curbs May Threaten Whole Foreign Policy

WASHINGTON, July 13 — (AP)—President Truman said today that recent United States curbs on foreign trade may threaten the mutual security program and pose a "very real dilemma" for our whole foreign policy.

He called for a new study of the policy of banning free world trade with the Communist orbit.

Truman directed the 12-man public advisory board for mutual security to make a broad study of the whole field of tariffs, import quotas, trade in farm products and customs procedures.

The board will make recommendations to the White House and to Congress.
