

Flyers Blast BYC 10-2 To Win Way Into Finals

With speedy Willie Dunn and playing-coach Allie Carver shooting four goals each the Parkdale Flyers unleashed a devastating attack on the Basista Youth Club at the Sports Arena last night and blasted their way into the Island Senior League finals against St. Dunstan's University with a 10-2 victory.

Well primed for the big contest the short-handed Flyers roared to the attack from the opening whistle and outskated outplayed and outplayed the youth club in racking up their big win.

Parkdale jumped into a 3-0 lead in the first period. The youth club cut it down to 3-1 in the first two minutes of the second but from that point on they were never in the game as the Flyers scored 4 straight goals for a big 7-1 lead going into the third. The Flyers outscored the B.Y.C. 3-1 in the last twenty minutes.

Allie Carver picked up one of his four goals in the first period and the other three in a second-period scoring binge. Dunn picked up singles in the first two periods and shot another brace in the third. Steady rightwinger Jim MacLeod scored the other two Parkdale goals.

Wally Shepherd and Brian Lewis each got one for the B.Y.C.

ROPER A STANDOUT

Despite the scoring spree of his teammates Parkdale goalie Frank Roper was the outstanding player on the ice. Time and again he turned aside point blank shots and came up with several spectacular saves. In all Roper was peppered with 34 shots and only missed on 2 of them.

Don Simmonds in the B.Y.C. cage had 29 drives sent his way but he had no visible means of support and many of the Flyers

goals came on breakaways that gave him little if any chance whatever.

Although at times the going was rough and the bumping rather heavy the game was fairly cleanly played. Referee Joe Revell passed around 11 minor penalties. Seven went to Parkdale.

Allie Carver opened the scoring at 10:31 of the first period and it was a heavy. Hurry, Skip Carver and Allie started a passing bout at the B.Y.C. blueline and Allie shifted his way around one defenseman to draw out Simmonds and score. Willie Dunn and Jim MacLeod combined for the second at 14:03. With one man back Dunn and MacLeod broke away. MacLeod drew the lone defender to one side and passed to Dunn in front and Willie shot it home.

Jim MacLeod broke away into the clear at 18:36 and coasted right in for the third Parkdale goal.

Final Callover For Grand National Race Saturday

LONDON (AP)—British bookies bracketed Sunday, Must and Carey's Cottage as joint favorites at 100 to 9 in Thursday night's final callover for Saturday Grand National steeplechase at Aintree.

Betting money showed Carey's Cottage, a nine-year-old bay gelding who has won only once in 37 races over fences and steeplechase courses, into favor at the last minute. He had been 20 to 1.

Many experts had expected Queen Mother Elizabeth's Devor Loch to move into the favorite spot after Tuesday's scratching of Quare Times, last year's winner. But the royal-owned 10-year-old remained at 100 to 8.

Carey's Cottage joined Gerald Balding's string in England only a few weeks ago. All his preparation for the big race, on which the

Irish hospitals sweepstakes prizes are based, was in Ireland.

Landy To Run In 5000 Metre Event

MELBOURNE, Australia (AP)—John Landy, world mile record holder, has refused to run in a mile or 5000-metre event at Bendigo Easter Fair meeting next Monday.

"I don't want to become involved in any fights," he said Thursday night.

Landy, who last week said he thought the Bendigo mile would be his best race of the year, withdrew because the Victorian Amateur Athletic Association asked for \$500 "patronage fee" to put on the race. The money was to go toward the cost of the association's overseas trips.

Bendigo, an inland city in the state of Victoria, originally agreed to pay the association 180 Australian pounds (\$403) for travel expenses and trophies.

Two weeks ago it asked the V.A.A. to include the mile event and give Landy a chance to break the world record. The association said it would do so for the extra "patronage fee." If Bendigo would not pay, the association said, it would stick to earlier arrangements and not allow the extra race. Bendigo refused to pay the extra because all takings from the meeting are going to charity.

Rangers Dump Habs 4-2; Detroit Whips Leafs 3-1

MONTREAL (CP) — New York Rangers, with revamped forward lines, a new goalie and all the fighting spirit in the world, came back Thursday night to defeat the proud Montreal Canadiens 4-2 and square the best-of-seven semi-final Stanley Cup series at one game each.

It was a far different team — with emphasis on the fighting spirit — from the one that fell before the highly favored Canadiens 7-1 Tuesday.

Gordie Bell, minor league goalie who was summoned to the Rangers' aid to replace Lorne Worsley, came up with a solid performance and was given first class protection by his mates.

Bronco Horvath, lanky third-line centre of the Rangers, broke a 2-2 deadlock early in the third period when Canadiens were short-handed and Dean Prentice added the clincher that squelched the desperate Canadiens with less than six minutes to go in the period.

The Rangers took a 2-1 lead in the first period on goals by Andy Hebenton and Jean-Guy Gendron, with a goal by Jean Beliveau sandwiched between them.

Claude Prout of Montreal scored the only goal of the second period while the Rangers were playing a man short.

RANGERS CHECK HARD

Instead of folding in the third period as they had done in almost every game played here this season — and lost — the New Yorkers kept up their brilliant checking and then struck for the victory long denied them on Montreal ice.

Their last win here was Jan. 30, 1954, in a regular National Hockey League fixture. They went 17 games before winning Thursday.

When the game ended, before 13,700 stunned Montreal fans, the entire Ranger squad swarmed around Bell, pummeling and embracing him in jubilation.

Little Lorne Worsley, in civilian clothes on the Rangers bench, was the first to greet Bell, as the replacement goalie clambered from the ice. Worsley threw his arms around Bell as they headed for the dressing room.

Rangers' reversal of form was so sharp that Canadiens found themselves always trying to catch up and then falling when opportunities came.

DETROIT (CP) — Coming from behind for the second straight game, the Detroit Red Wings dumped the Toronto Maple Leafs 3-1 Thursday night to take a commanding 2-0 game lead in their Stanley Cup semi-finals hockey series.

The Maple Leafs owned a 1-0 lead after one period of play but could not cope with the fired-up Red Wings in the next two.

It was a game marked by brutal play and thrilling action. But the Red Wings, second-place finishers in the National Hockey League, waited only one period before taking control of the game.

The pattern at the start was much the same as in Tuesday night's contest, when Detroit had to overcome a two-goal deficit in the final period to pick off a 3-2 victory.

It was veteran Ted Lindsay who supplied the spark that touched off the stirring rally Thursday night. The 160-pound fireball, who plays best when the chips are down, got the goal that broke the tie.

But the way the little guy scored his 34th playoff goal had the crowd of 13,918 shaking the rafters in the Olympia. Lindsay was in the middle of a melee more than halfway through the third period and in a personal battle with Toronto's Tod Sloan, suffered a gash over his eye. It required three stitches to close but Lindsay was back on the ice after missing only one turn after his penalty.
