conformity to the new ideas, had in turn to be considered, and these have absorbed our energies until now.

To-day, however, as in pre-reformation times, the world is striving to escape from the crushing tyranny of crystallized thought, and is turning again to the gospel message for new inspiration and light.

If this be so, does it not suggest an answer to our question, "Why is it that so many men take little interest in the affairs of their church?" May it not be that the ideals therein set forth are often too narrow, too arbitrary and too feeble to inspire and quicken their souls? What man demands is an ideal which will co-ordinate the work God is carrying forward in the natural kingdom with his scheme for the future as revealed in Jesus Christ, a solution of the world problems that perplex and embarrass us.

For this men everywhere are expectantly waiting, and will not be satisfied with less. The churches, meanwhile, are expending most of their energy in the fruitless task of striving to retain the new wine of modern thought in the old bottles of dogmatic theology. God, however, works on, and to-day the great soul of Christianity is quickening with new life. Ay! is already becoming articulate.

In the ever increasing complexities of daily life; in the absorption of individual effort into great organizations subject to a single control, in our improved method of communication and transit which are co-ordinating the industrial lives of the nations of the earth, we can surely discern the finger of God forcing men to realize their interdependence in Him.

If you can conceive of Christ's kingdom as pertaining wholly to another world than this, such facts as these may scarcely deserve consideration. But if you believe that Christ's kingdom is in course of construction here and now, if you believe that no action takes place in this world but is effective towards carrying out God's purposes, then you must realize that they have a far deeper significance. You must realize that the socialistic problems of to-day are fundamentally religious problems of deep import and must be inevitably treated as such. What men need to-day is not the reiteration of religious formula but a comprehensive ideal expressive of the underlying realities of Christianity that will inspire and spiritualize their souls toward carrying out the work they have to do here.

At the Reformation man was called upon to face the problem. "What: in the Christian economy are the relations of the individual to God?" The question that is presenting itself to-day is—"What, in the Christian economy, are to be the relations of man to his fellowman?"

enters upon the task of supplying it, she will find her efforts resolving into a mere struggle for existence. Thank God she is awakening the world over, and as a consequence is displaying new vigor.

It may be objected that the ideas just presented are merely glittering generalities, altogether elusive and not susceptible of practical application. So, it may be retorted, are the ideas embodying any great ideal. Take that of Imperial Federation, for instance. No one is foolish or bold enough to suggest how it is to be carried into effect. But is it not, to-day, a potent influence inspiring our hearts and directing our actions? Have not our sons already laid down their lives for it, and do we not feel assured that in the fulness of time the means will not be lacking to justify our hopes.

Of this be certain, unless our church can offer us lofty ideals susceptible of being carried into effect in our daily lives, she will never secure sympathy and support.

On the other hand, be the members of a church ever so few, and their position in relation to their surroundings ever so insignificant, if their souls are inspired with noble thoughts, which they as an organized body seek to give expression to in their daily lives, there exists no power that can stay their progress, and they will never lack means adequate for the carrying on of their work.

This, I take it, is the principle at the foundation of all problems of parochial finance.

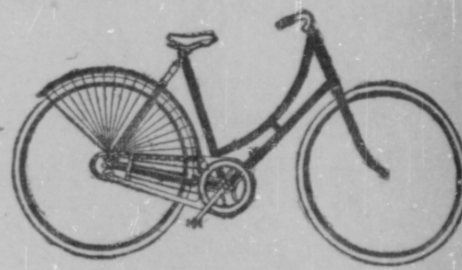

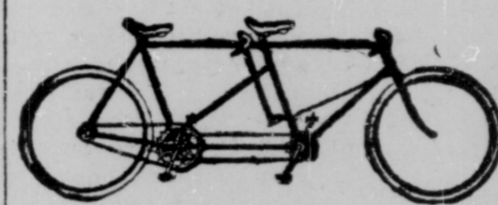
