The Grand Jurors, having concluded their labors, were this forenoon discharged. Previous to their discharge Mr. Angus, the foreman of the jury, submitted the following report on behalf of himself and fellows: Grand Jury Room, July 3, 1896. We the Grand Jurors of our Sovereign Lady the Queen, summoned for Trinity Term of the Supreme Court, A. D. 1896, submit the following report: We have visited the Jail, Asylum and Poor House. The Jail we found well looked after, clean, and the officers capable and efficient. In the Asylum we found everything done by its officers and attendants for the government and comfort of its inmates. The provisions were examined and pronounced wholesome and good. The wards were clean and well attended to, but the building is altogether unfit for the comfort or health of such a large number of patients, all the sleeping rooms having about fifty per cent. more patients than they should have, and we were pleased to hear that it is the intention of the government to have an addition made to the present building. At the Poor House we found that the spring house cleaning had not yet been done, and that the wards were in any thing but a proper state of cleanliness for the comfort and health of the inmates. The buildings are altogether unsuitable, and there does not seem to be sufficient help to keep them in proper condition. We would direct the attention of the authorities to this institution, and hope that matters will be remedied as soon as possible. We believe the officer in charge is doing what he can with the means at his disposal. Our attention was directed to a sewer which discharged into the harbor at the foot of Great George Street, which is claimed to be a nuisance inasmuch as it is a menace to the health of the citizens who live and do business in that locality in summer, and destroys one of the principal landings on the ice in winter. We have a number of respectable gentlemen before us and after hearing their evidence, we find that the nuisance complained of was thoroughly established and would draw the attention of the authorities to this matter for their immediate attention. All of which is respectfully submitted. THE WORLD OF SPORT.

The Wheel. In the C.W.A. met at Quebec on Dominion Day for the professional mile championship, L. Longhead and Angus McLeod tied for first place. Time, 2:23 4/5. McLeod claimed the race and declined to run off the tie. McLeod won over the course alone in 2:20 1/5. Blainey, of Simcoe, won the half mile amateur championship in 1:19. Cameron, of Montreal, got the amateur. The two mile tandem professional championship was won by McCall and Graiz, Toronto. Time, 5:34. The professional half mile open was won by Longhead easily in 1:25 2/5. John Davidson won the amateur five mile championship. The Wanderers of Montreal won the team race. Cooper, of Bradford, won the mile professional, 2:40 class, in 2:37 1/5. The bicycle relay race from Halifax to Windsor took place on Wednesday morning, leaving Halifax at 9 o'clock and arriving in Windsor at 11:41. The race was between the Halifax and five Windsor teams. The Halifax teams won by two minutes. John S. Johnson, the American bicyclist, riding on the Catford track, London, on Wednesday, with a flying start, went a quarter of a mile in 24 1/5 seconds, and a third of a mile in 32 3/5 seconds, both being new European records. In the sports at Windsor, on Dominion Day, Caldwell, of Summerside, took second place in the three-mile handicap bicycle race. The Turf. The races at St. John on Wednesday were well attended.
