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THE REGISTRY OFFICE JOB.

To the Editor of the Examiner: Sir,—The last Argus contains an article entitled "An Unjust Attack," which is an attempted reply to my letter. As to who I am, I think a matter of indifference—what the public are most concerned with is, are the charges true? The Argus well says that they are "serious charges"—they are indeed, and I maintain that they are unanswerable.

1.
