

# Want Cuts In U.S. Tariff Before Power Agreement

Free trade into the United States of a range of Canadian products should be made a condition of any Canadian-American power agreement which would flood Canadian territory, or affect future generation of power in Canada, in the opinion of the policy committee of the Canada Exporters' Association.

Provision should also be made for Canada to receive "an equitable portion" of power developed in the United States under such agreements.

The policy committee's recommendation was presented today to the Canadian exporters' annual meeting, which will decide for acceptance, rejection or revision on Wednesday.

So far as named, the products for which free entry would be asked are from the mines, forests and farms.

Under the recommendation, the federal government would be asked not to make power agreements of the kind named unless "the United States Congress agrees by solemn treaty to remove permanently tariff or other obstacles to the importation from Canada or primary metals, minerals, oil, gas, lumber, pulp and paper and agricultural products, as well as other products, which can be produced efficiently in Canada for use or consumption in the United States."

Canadian exporters, attempting to increase their sales in the United States, were frustrated either by the action, or threat of action, by the United States Congress to increase rates of duty or invoke quota controls — notwithstanding that every American state benefitted substantially from exports to Canada, the committee said.

The recommendation on power was one of a list of seven made by the policy committee.

One of them urged expanded credit facilities for the export trade.

It said credit facilities exist abroad which go beyond anything the exporter can obtain in Canada either from the banks or from the crown-operated export credits insurance corporation.

The department of trade and commerce was asked to extend goodwill trade missions, notably in Europe and the British West Indies.

## French Charge Arms For Rebels In Algeria Came From Egypt

ORAN, Algeria (CP) — French authorities charged Thursday that 2,000,000 worth of arms they captured on the yacht Athos was being sent to Alexandria by Egyptian army volunteers and was destined for Algerian rebels.

The 400-ton Athos, which the French said once was a minesweeper with the Canadian Navy, was reported to have been intercepted Wednesday by the French escort vessel Commandant de Pi-modan off the port of Nemours, Western Algeria.

An admiralty spokesman in Paris said the Athos was flying no national flag. The yacht's captain was described in one report as being of British origin while another said the craft was under command of an Italian carrying both Greek and Costa Rican passports.

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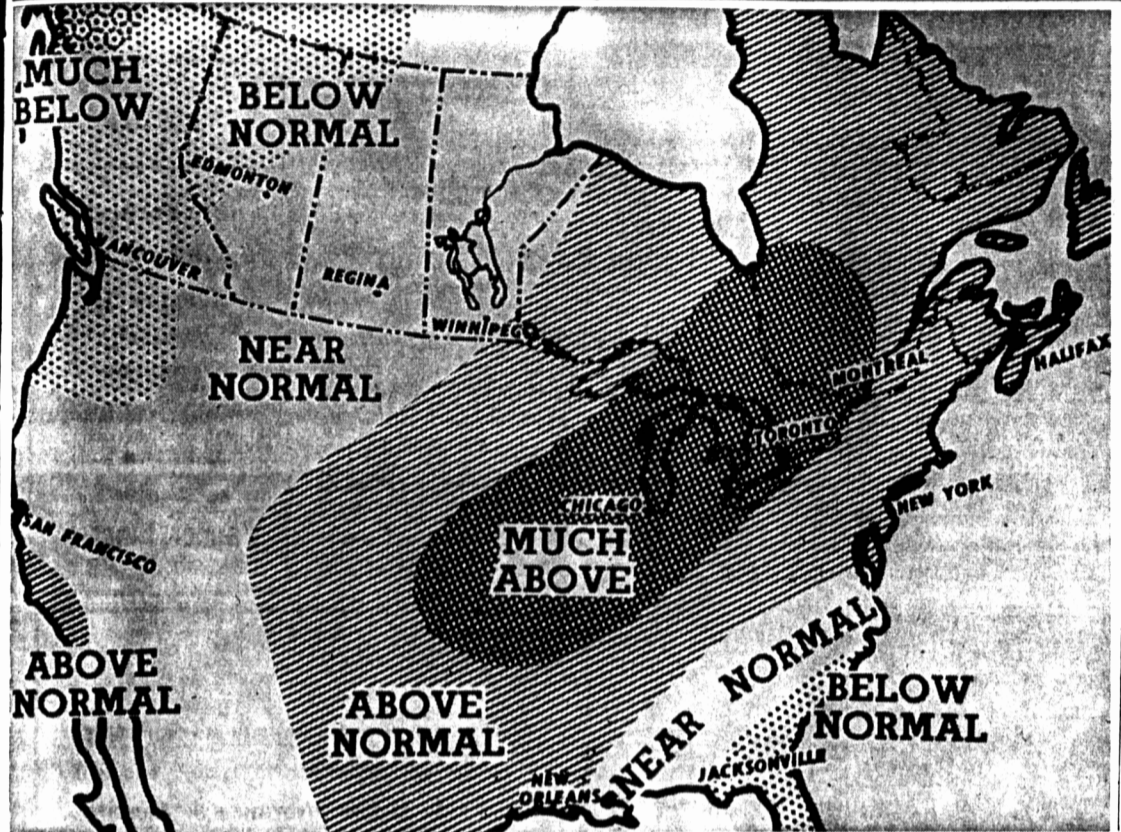
grenades and ammunition. There were also some German light machine-guns and Dutch and Belgian weapons, the French said.

WASHINGTON, — While Eastern Canada can expect above-normal temperatures for the next 30 days, most of the Prairie Provinces will have near-normal readings according to this map based on the long-range forecast of the United States weather service.

Northern Alberta and most of British Columbia are expected to have below normal temperatures. Readings much above seasonal normals are expected in a section stretching from the Great Lakes and St. Lawrence River to James Bay.
