I. O. O. F.—A new Encampment of the Independent Order of Oddfellows was instituted at Moncton, N. B., last evening. This makes the requisite number in the Maritime Provinces for the formation of a Grand Encampment, which will at once follow, and give an additional representative to the Sovereign Grand Lodge.

ST. JAMES' HALL.—The Tea and Fancy Fair in St. James' Hall last evening was very successful. There was a large attendance, and the different tables were well patronized. The proceeds, after expenses are paid, will be about \$250. The proceedings were interspersed with choice musical selections by Messrs. Earle, Stirling, Wilson and others.

ABSENT MINDED.—A rather peculiar case of absent mindedness occurred on Queen Street this morning. A former resident of this city was in conversation with one of our citizens, when a prominent insurance man, in passing, noticed the stranger, advanced and shook hands heartily with "the other man," and did not discover his mistake until shortly after, when he returned and grasped the hand of the person intended to be recognized.

S. P. C. A.—At a meeting of the Executive Committee held yesterday afternoon, a constitution and by-laws for the government of the society were adopted, and it was decided to apply at the present session of the Legislature for an act of incorporation. A committee was appointed to procure a suitable prosecutor. Persons can become honorary or life members of the society on payment of five dollars. An effort will be made to establish branches of the society throughout the Island.

COLLISION.—The International Steamship Co.'s steamer New Brunswick, while on the trip from Portland to Eastport, collided with the schr. Annie Knight, of Boston, at two o'clock on Tuesday morning, off Montserrat. The schooner, which was loaded with bricks, was sunk, and her crew had a narrow escape from drowning. The steamer is stove in above the guard, and one paddle is badly disabled. The schooner's bow penetrated two of the steamer's staterooms. The fireman of the steamer was badly injured.

A NOVEL TEMPERANCE PLEDGE.—At a meeting of miners at Cow Bay, C. B., recently, it was unanimously agreed to adopt the following regulations to govern all employed at the mines next summer: Any persons found entering a place where liquor is sold, to be liable to a fine of \$1; being drunk \$2. For each day lost through drink, \$4. These rules were adopted first by Banner Lodge, P. W. A., three years ago, but, owing to those not in the union being free to indulge at pleasure, it was hopeless to attempt to enforce the rules on those belonging to the Lodge. Now that all employed in the mine have agreed to be bound by the same rules, it is expected that much practical good will result.

THE COMING TREAT.—Frederic Villiers, who is to lecture in the Y. M. C. A. Hall here on Monday and Tuesday evenings next, is drawing full houses everywhere. The Halifax Chronicle says: "Mr. Villiers was greeted with a magnificent audience at the Academy last night, fashionable Halifax turning out in full force, the military element being conspicuous. His lecture was of a discursive character, giving many interesting reminiscences of his adventures as a war correspondent in Afghanistan and Egypt. The views thrown upon the canvas were greeted with admiration, and the course of his narrative, descriptions and anecdotes interrupted with applause. To-night being the last opportunity of hearing this distinguished artist, correspondent and brave heroic man, will no doubt be taken advantage of by another large audience."

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

The Jesuits' Estates Act Again.

Col. O'Brien's Resolution Lost.

OTTAWA, March 28. Hon. David Mills, in resuming the debate on the motion for the disallowance of the Jesuits' Estates Act, said he had no doubt that the majority of the House would support the Government. The Liberal opposition would be in the main with this majority, and as this was a very suspicious position for the opposition to occupy, he for one thought it necessary to explain the vote he intended to give. The motion of the member for Muskego, was in his opinion, laden with mischief, as it sought to arouse religious animosity and to kindle mischief. To affirm the principle laid down in Col. O'Brien's motion, would be to put an end to constitutional government in the country. There was no doubt that this question was especially dangerous, from the fact that it was a religious question. He was opposed to the disallowance asked for, because he considered it would be an undue interference with provincial rights. The legislature of Quebec was free to deal with the funds of the province as it chose. The province was sovereign for this purpose.

After recess,—Charlton spoke in support of the disallowance resolution, though his convictions forbid his voting with the majority on the subject, would perhaps result in his being retired to private life at the close of this Parliament. The debate was continued until 1.30 o'clock, being concluded by addresses from Hon. Wilfred Laurier, Sir John Macdonald and Sir Richard Cartwright, all in support and explanation of the allowance of the Act. The O'Brien resolution was then lost on a division of 13 to 188, the ayes being as follows, viz.: McCarthy, McNeill, Tyrwhitt, Barron, Bell, Denison, Charlton, Cockburn, Macdonald, (Huron), O'Brien, Wallace, Sutherland and Seriver. The House adjourned at 2 o'clock. The Government has definitely awarded the contract of the Cape Breton Railway Bridge to Isbester & Reid.

Two More Suicides.

ANTWERP, March 28. Ferdinand Vandertraelen, merchant prince, of this city, committed suicide yesterday. The act was due to the failure of several allied firms, whose liabilities will probably reach a colossal sum. Vandertraelen was a member of the Liberal party, and has been dubbed the John Bright of Belgium.

GENEVA, March 28. One of the largest bankers and stockbrokers in this city committed suicide to-day. He suffered heavy losses through the copper speculation.

Collision at Sea.

NORFOLK, Va., March 28. The Old Dominion steamer Wynoke arrived here to-night. She was in collision this morning with the schooner Ruth Darling, of Bucksport, Me., for New Haven. Captain Lowell and seaman Charles Harrison were lost. The weather was very thick, and while the Wynoke was lying by the schooner another schooner ran into the steamer, but got off in the dark before it was learned whether she was hurt.

Printers on Strike.

MONCTON, March 28. The printers in the Transcript office are out on strike. The men say there has been dissatisfaction for some time, but the immediate cause of the strike is a demand that the men should work an hour later at night than other industrial establishments.

Another Plot Discovered.

LONDON, March 28. It is stated that the discovery of an illicit manufacture of bombs at Zurich has furnished a clue to a gigantic plot existing throughout Russia for a new series of attempts upon the life of the Czar. Numerous arrests have been made.

Counterfeiter Arrested.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., March 28. Detective Lawrence last night arrested a dangerous counterfeiter named L. S. Brown in the act of casting a number of coins. He is an old soldier, and draws a pension of twenty dollars.
