Latest from Europe! News by the Cable!

New York, Oct. 15. A despatch from Quebec announces a terrible fire in St. Roch and St. Saviour, which destroyed the suburbs of that city on Sunday night.

Advices from Europe by steamship Belgian at Farther Point are to the 5th. The Queen has conferred the order of Knighthood on Captain Anderson, Professor Thomson, and Messrs. Glass and Canning, and a Baronetcy on Messrs. Sampson and Gooch, on account of services rendered in laying the Atlantic Cable.

The seizure of the British steamer Tornado by Spain and imprisonment of her crew on suspicion of being a Chilean privateer, is said to be assuming a serious aspect.

The Times suggests that England should offer to submit her neutrality laws together with those of the United States to revision by a mixed commission.

Gold 157. QUEBEC, Oct. 15. The whole district West of Crown Street to St. Saviour Toll Gate, nearly a mile, is burnt.

17 Churches and Convents are destroyed, 20,000 houses in ashes. 20,000 people rendered homeless.

A public meeting has been called for the relief of the sufferers.

NEW YORK, 16th. Steamship Scotia arrived today, bringing European dates to the 7th. There is no political news of interest.

John Van Buren, son of the late President Van Buren, died on board the Scotia three days before her arrival.

The Herald's special says, that a large amount of military stores arrived there last night. The military at Fort Erie are under arms all night and special police sworn in.

A large number of families were turned out of their homes losing everything.

Montreal, 16th. Petitions to the Queen to defer the Confederation Question until a new Parliament is called to settle details, particularly the School Question, are to be extensively circulated. (Boah).

London, Oct. 15. Money Market slightly firmer. Consol. 89 1/2. U. S. 5-20's 70 1/2.

No General news. New York, Oct. 16. Details of the Quebec fire give the number of buildings destroyed at 2,500; persons rendered homeless 10,000, and loss of property at two and a half to three million dollars.

The loss by the fire in Ottawa, is from \$30,000 to \$50,000. The arms seized from the Fenians at time of the recent raid into Canada are to be restored to them, not hereafter to be used in violation of our neutrality laws.

Gold 148 1/2. We have just learned that the Proclamation, calling the Legislature, to take into consideration the offer of the Delegates, giving this Island £200,000 to go into Confederation, will be issued forthwith.
