the distinguished visitors as may have been accustomed to associate life in Canada with much that is rude and unrefined. English literature and fashions exercise a paramount influence in the sister Isle, just as they do in Halifax, and more, perhaps, than they do in St. John, in which Boston and New York unite with London and Paris in influencing the social and intellectual tastes of our people. A variety of social aspects and sentiments is thus produced, fitted to add zest to a visit such as that which has been made. Then the physical aspect of the Island and character and extent of its agricultural, fishing and other industries must have proved matters of interest to the distinguished visitors. The trip to Rustico, which is so charmingly situated, must have proved a most enjoyable one, and seems to have been admirably arranged and carried out. We have not, we think, misinterpreted the tastes of our readers, and least of all of the lady readers of the *Telegraph*, in inferring that they would like to hear all about the doings of the Governor General in Prince Edward Island, and of the movements of the Princess, whom they so often called "charming," while she was in St. John. We have therefore given many particulars of the visit to the Island, and of the way in which its fair daughters bore themselves on that occasion. As we are not often called upon to chronicle such events, the appearance among us of a Princess Royal, being like angel visits, few and far between, few of our readers will grudge the space which we have given to the closing events of the trip. Now that the representative of the *Telegraph* has seen the distinguished visitors off in the *Druid* yesterday morning, the curtain drops on the Vice-Regal trip to the Maritime Provinces.

THE REASON WHY.

It is said that the cause of the Governor General and the Princess remaining on board the *Druid* at Charlottetown, instead of taking up quarters in Government House, was a dispute between the Lieut. Governor and the Provincial Government as to who should pay the expenses of preparing the house for their reception. What we do not understand is how His Excellency could know, "officially," anything about such a dispute, if any existed; and even if it came to his knowledge, how he could take notice of it. That Government House was prepared in good style for their Excellencies' reception, and that they were invited to its hospitable, are facts; and that they would have been heartily welcomed is not to be doubted for a moment. It is a subject for regret that from whatever cause, the distinguished visitors remained on the steamer, especially as the Princess' health appears to have suffered from the motion of the vessel in the harbor.

Prorogation of Parliament.

Parliament was prorogued on the 15th inst. The speech from the throne was as follows: My Lords and Gentlemen, I am happy to be able to relieve you from your laborious duties. My relations with the other powers continue cordial, and my influence with them will be employed in maintaining the obligations imposed by treaties, promoting and consolidating public peace. The territorial arrangements stipulated in the treaty of Berlin has been faithfully executed, and delineation of the new frontiers is nearly completed. The Balkan peninsula has been evacuated by the Russian Army in accordance with the treaty, and under unanimous sanction of signatory powers. Suitable provision has been made for the Government of Roumelia. I have, with great satisfaction, given my sanction to the election of a Prince of Bulgaria. Calamities of late war have hitherto precluded the adoption of those reforms by the Government of which it has acknowledged necessity. I have urged and shall urge the importance of timely compliance with its engagements in this respect. At the suggestion of my Government in conjunction with that of France a change has taken place in Vice-Royalty of Egypt which past mis-government in that country rendered necessary. A Treaty concluded with the Ameer of Afghanistan which has been laid before you, has happily terminated the war, which his predecessor compelled me to undertake. By it my friendly relations with Afghanistan are re-established, guarantees for its peace and safety are given, and frontiers of India strengthened. The ability displayed by those in command of my troops, and gallantry and endurance of troops themselves will deserve thanks bestowed upon them by both Houses. My acknowledgements are especially due to the many native princes who offered their assistance, as well as those whose forces were actually brought into the field. I recognize in such co-operation their attachment and good will to my Indian empire. Since I last addressed you my forces have been engaged in serious conflict with most powerful native rulers in South Africa. While I have pleasure in thanking them for vindicating the honor of the British arms, I must mourn over the sacrifice of many precious lives. I trust the decisive success which has recently attended their operations will lead to an early establishment of peace on an enduring basis, and that my subjects in that part of the world, being thus relieved from the danger to which they have hitherto been exposed, may readily join in such arrangements as may best secure their safety and prosperity in the future.

Here follows the usual paragraph thanking the House of Commons for voting supplies, and speech continues: "My Lords and Gentlemen, by the army discipline bill act, you have or the first time, placed upon the statute book a clear, comprehensive code of laws relating to military service. The Acts providing for the appointment of a public prosecutor and amending laws relating to summary jurisdiction of magistrates, will, I trust, greatly improve the administration of the criminal law. The law

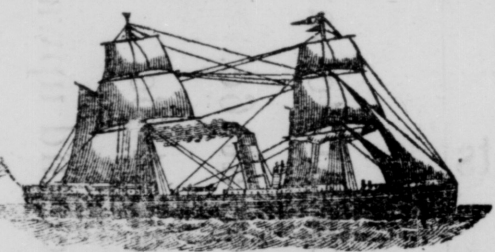
relating to banking and joint stock companies is well calculated to conduce to the prosperity of our commercial system. I have had much pleasure in complying with your request to appoint a commissioner to enquire into the cause of depression in agriculture. I have observed with pleasure that you have agreed to measures relative to education in Ireland, which form a fitting supplement to the intermediate education act. In bidding you farewell, I pray that the blessing of Providence may rest upon your labors.

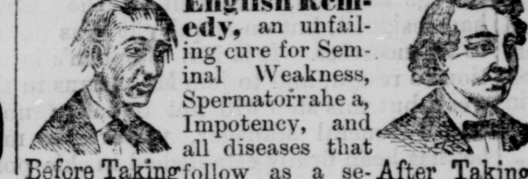
