

Washington Senators New Club After Winter Trades

WASHINGTON (AP) — Washington Senators are a thoroughly revamped club as a result of the big winter trades. Only one player who started the 1955 season may be back at the same place for opening day of 1956.

That is third baseman Eddie Yost, the club's 10-year veteran. The rest of the club is going to pose a problem. Here's one guess as to how the club will start the season:

Sievers and Runnels were in last year's opening day lineup, but

RACING PROGRAM

The larger raceways in the United States have to make their plans far ahead of their racing dates. We have just received a program from the Lexington Trot Breeders Association, Lexington, Ky., giving their program of racing from Sept. 26 through October 6. The estimated purses are \$350,000. The principal event will be the Kentucky Futurity for 3-year-old trotters. It will be its 64th renewal and the purse is estimated at \$80,000. Last year it was won by Scott Frost. There are 41 events, the final being a 2-year-old trot for fillies with a purse of \$10,000.

To make these futurities a success the Lexington Trot Association must receive an enormous entry list and of course many who enter with expectations of racing there find that at the time approaches for the events that their entry isn't good enough. In some of the events such as those for 2-year-olds and 3-year-olds there may be as many as 70 entries as the proud owner looks over his well-bred youngster and believes that in a few months he will become a star. Even now the 2-year-olds are racing and racing around in Florida. Some of them may possibly be over-trained by such early speed. We noticed that Joe O'Brien in California is pursuing his usual cautious course with his 2-year-olds, his best mile to date being a shade better than 2.50.

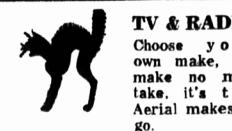
Bell announced Friday that Cooper, as representative of the executive committee of the nine professional teams in Canada, suggested the two leagues get together in effort to iron out existing differences.
