

Sharp Drop In Unemployment Payments Noted

There has been a sharp reduction in the number of people drawing unemployment insurance benefits as of January 12th this year, and the same date in 1951. Information supplied by the National Employment Office Charlottetown which handles all claims for residents of King's and Queen's Counties, including Charlottetown shows the total benefit claimants at present as 1093. One year ago this figure was 1440. Of the present total of 1093 slightly more than fifty per cent are rural residents.
