Tenants' Right Meeting.

A large and respectable meeting of the
tenants of Charlottetown was held on
Friday evening last, to take into considera-
tion the proposed tax upon Real Estate and
Income. After the usual preliminaries and
several excellent and telling speeches had
been made, the following resolutions were
put and unanimously carried:—

1. Resolved, That in view of the present
strenuous opposition of the landlords to
the proposed tax by the Civic Council of
Charlottetown on Real Estate and the
gigantic efforts put forth by them to coerce
the Civic Council, we, the tenants, form
ourselves into a league for the protection
of the tenants' rights, to be called the
"Tenants' Right League."

2. Whereas, We, the tenants, have, by pay-
ing a tax of ten and twelve per cent. on an
exorbitant rent enabled the City of Char-
lottetown to lay platforms, open up streets,
purchase fire engines, house, etc., to pro-
tect the property of landlords, and to make
more valuable the same;

Resolved Therefore, That we give our un-
divided support to the Civic Council who
have had the courage and manliness to
place one and a quarter per cent. on Real
Estate.

3. Whereas, Certain landlords are en-
deavouring to let houses and still extort the
tax on same from the tenants by inserting
clauses in leases to that effect;

Resolved Therefore, That we the Tenant
Right League bind ourselves that we will
not rent or hire any house from any such
landlord or proprietor, and that we will
give warning and leave all properties where
such tax is imposed.

4. Whereas, All the improvements made
in the City since the Incorporation have
been paid for by taxation out of the pockets
of the tenants, the City Council be asked
to levy all taxes on Real Estate, and Horses
and carriages, and upon incomes exceeding
\$500 of citizens who pay no Real Estate
tax, and two dollars per head upon all
voters.

5. Whereas, The Government has seen fit
to exempt from income taxation all
officials of the Government and clergy;

Resolved, That we strengthen the hands
of the City Council to frame such law and
to enforce it that shall deny the right of
citizenship to all men who do not contrib-
ute something towards the City fund.

6. Whereas, The tax upon personal prop-
erty, such as on furniture, is onerous in
the extreme, and also upon goods on the
shelf or in warehouse, and would bear upon
the poor man. Such tax would be put
upon the price of goods, and as we consider
there is a tariff high enough at present, we
therefore pledge ourselves to use our in-
fluence against any member of the civic
body who shall attempt to justify it.

7. Whereas, The pumps and wells of the
city are in bad order and are not cleaned
out regularly as they should be for the
amount that they cost every year, and are
at present many of them unfit to use water
from.

Resolved, That we demand that the City
Council shall see, through its proper offi-
cer, that every pump in the city is thor-
oughly cleaned out, and boxed around in
such manner that no filth or refuse matter
can run down the sides of the pump like it
does at present.

8. Whereas a large amount of debt now
rests upon the city by overdraft and by de-
bentures, upon which interest is paid,

Resolved, Therefore that we consider it in-
expedient to have any more debentures
issued, and that we will uphold our City
Council in putting on a tax of two per cent
on value of real estate, in order to meet
current expenses, and to pay off all debts
promptly for which the city is liable at present.

9. Whereas, When the tenants paid the
taxes we had a City Surveyor.

Resolved, That the City Council be re-
quested to appoint at an early date, a Sur-
veyor or Inspector of buildings, whose
duties will be to see that no buildings en-
croach upon the streets and that no incom-
petent person be allowed to plan and erect
unsafe buildings, liable to fall upon persons
viz., like Wright & McNutt's did, to survey
for new streets, to inspect the building of
drains and crossings, and to have a general
oversight of all city works in conjunction
with our energetic Street Commissioner.

10. Whereas, Certain Landlords of a few
little shanties, for which they have for
years, extorted exorbitant rents, are en-
deavouring to make the Real Estate Tax a dead
letter, and to shirk the payment of a just
tax, and to starve the public works of the
city by a penurious policy,

Resolved, That a Black Book shall be
kept by the Tenant Right League, and all
names of such parties be entered therein for
information of members of said League for
future action thereon.

11. Resolved, That nothing contained in the
above resolutions is intended for or shall
be understood as in any way reflecting upon
those owners of real estate who have man-
fully come forward and given their support
to the City Council to frame such law, as a
tax on real estate, and who are anxious to
clear our city of debt.

Resolved, That the funds of this insti-
tution shall be kept for the express purpose
of paying the taxes which may be levied
upon the property of any poor man unable
to pay his tax upon his house, provided
such inability results from sickness or other
misfortunes, over which he may have no
control, and that he is the owner of no
other property.

TENANT RIGHT LEAGUE.

What the Stars Say.

A CORRESPONDENT of the Moncton Times
thus disposes of the Rev. C. C. Collins'
"Wonders of the Heavens" which appeared
in THE EXAMINER a short time ago.

Let us first notice the position of the
Moon. As the last quarter will take place
June 18th, the time selected is most unfor-
tunate for the seer in this respect, for then
the moon's attraction will be nearly at a
quadrature with that of the Sun,—the time
being that of neap tides,—which of itself
will be sufficient to take three-fourths of
the edge of his argument.

As for the planet Mercury, it has just
passed its superior conjunction, (May 17th)
and on the 19th June will be 1 hour and
49 minutes East of the Sun, as seen from
the Earth, and about its mean distance from
the centre of the System. This differs
materially from its representation in the
diagram.

Neither will Venus be in the direction in-
dicated, as its inferior conjunction occurred
on the 2d of May, and consequently it will
be 2 hours and 58 minutes in advance of
the Sun on the 19th of June. Here is a
nice little disagreement again.

No conjunction of Mars has taken place,
nor will any occur during the year 1881.
(Its opposition will be Dec. 24th.) On the
19th of June it will be 4 hours and 5 min-
utes in advance of the sun; and as its
perihelion will take place on the 26th of
May, we must rule it out of the threaten-
ing combination.

Jupiter, the largest of all the planets,
passed its conjunction on the 22nd of
April; and will, therefore, be on the 19th of
June, 2 hours and 28 minutes, or 37 degrees
in advance of the Sun.

Saturn's conjunction took place on the
21st of April, only two hours in advance of
Jupiter. Right ascension on the 19th of
June, 2 hours and 53 minutes, or over 43
degrees in advance of the Sun.

Uranus was in opposition on the 1st of
March; it will be in quadrature on the 30th
of May, and not in conjunction till Sep-
tember 6th. At the time predicted it
will be 5 hours and 24 minutes East of
the Sun, or nearly in opposition to the
Moon, and certainly not in a position to
aid in a general conspiracy against the
Earth.

Last of all we have Neptune, whose con-
junction was passed on the 3rd of May. On
the 19th of June it will appear about 2
hours and 28 minutes in advance of the Sun,
and about three-quarters of a degree south
of Jupiter.

From these phenomena of the planets it
appears that at the time referred to, the
right ascension of Venus, Jupiter, Saturn
and Neptune will only differ about 7 1/2
degrees, and their declination less than half
that amount. So near a proximity of four
of the principal planets can only take place
at long intervals;—although they will be
somewhat closer on the 18th than on the
19th;—but then the Sun, Moon, Mercury
and Uranus will be so differently situated
from what has been represented, as to leave
no ground of apprehension on account of
their combined attractive influence.

Had the writer of the article in question
selected the time of new moon, on the 27th
of April, he might have made out a much
better case; for then Venus was within five
days of conjunction, and Neptune six days,
while Jupiter and Saturn were only the
same number of days past their conjunc-
tions, and Mercury and Mars much nearer
than they will be on the 19th of June.
And since that time passed by without
disaster, no one need be under the least
concern on account of the aspect of the
planets during the remainder of 1881.

Park Corner Notes.

The farmers in this section of the coun-
try are getting along splendidly with their
planting, considering the backward spring.
James Doyle has a very fine messenger
colt. He has, we understand, been offered
\$120 for him, and refused the offer with
the expectation of getting a better price.

Capt. James Reynolds, while in A. Mc-
Leod's employ, fell the other day from a
load of hay, and got very badly hurt.

Park Corner School is progressing well
under the efficient management of J. Mar-
tin. There was a concert held here some
time ago for the pupils, and it proved a
grand success.

The long and much looked for gasper-
aux has come at last; but the people are
prohibited from catching them, and are
watched strictly by the Inspector.

Lobster business is the topic of the day
in this city. Wm. McLeod, Esq., has
erected a large factory. We wish him every
success in his undertaking.

Rising Star Division is in a very flourish-
ing condition. The Rev. Mr. Mason joined
a few nights ago, and he seems to take a
great interest in the Temperance cause.
We can, without a fear of contradiction,
say that it is the banner division of P. E.
Island.
