

Hold Memorial Service At Spring Brook

The Rev. Canon J. T. Abbott of St. Paul's Anglican Church, Charlotteville, was the guest speaker at the annual memorial service at the soldiers monument in Spring Brook, yesterday.

Speaking on the large congregations on the church grounds and nearby through an efficient sound system, Canon Abbott took for his text the words found in the fourth verse of "This is the victory that overcometh the world, even the faith." In his world, even an inspiring sermon he splendidly portrayed the power of faith in gaining victory over wrong and asserted that they who made the great sacrifice did not lose their lives but gave them in the belief that victory can only come by sacrifice through faith.

The speaker voiced the consensus of the greatest sentiment that another war means the loss of humanity, "therefore we should all dedicate ourselves to the course of lasting peace as they who had laid down their lives in two great wars had hoped we would."

He said "we honor them for their faith and sacrifice, their courage and their faith." The Rev. V. Leigh Dingwell organist, led in the singing of the hymns "O God Our Help In Ages Past" and "O Valiant Hearts".

Special selections by the choir were the anthem "Bless O Lord My Soul" (Vanoff); "The Lord's My Shepherd" (Cromand); "Beside Still Waters" (Hamblen). Mrs. J. B. R. Anderson was soloist.

The Rev. S. H. Haslam acted as chairman for this service and Mr. Douglas Fox, student minister, read the scripture lesson and led in prayer.

The names on the monuments were read by Rev. Mr. Haslam and Mr. Fox and the two minutes silence was broken by the reading of "They Shall Grow Not Old" by the chairman. On behalf of the committee he extended a welcome to the people who had "braved the heat of the day". The members of the committee were Messrs. Ernest Dunning, Hillard Meek and Roland Paynter.

FREDERICTON (CP) — Prolonged hot, dry weather, coupled with lightning, resulted in several weekend forest fires in New Brunswick.

The largest started Sunday afternoon in Gloucester county, south of Allardville. Forestry officials here said it had covered more than a mile and if the flames leaped Pisiquid brook they would enter a slash area. No buildings or communities were threatened.

Another fire broke out Saturday in the same district, near Red Pine, but was subdued.

Lightning started four small outbreaks in Victoria county. Fires at Stoney Creek, Albert county, and between Sackville and Memramcook were reported under control.
