PARLIAMENT OF CANADA

The Government Gives Guarantee to Senate.

Senate Postpones its Inquiry into the Drummond County Railway.

BUSINESS PUSHED AT THE LAST.

Parliament Prorogues At 8 o'clock

OTTAWA, June 30.—Mr. Ock's Post Office bill was put through yesterday but the contract clause dropped.

The Crow's Nest Pass Railway Bill passed third reading and was sent to the Senate.

The Senate committee of investigation met yesterday morning organized and adjourned till today.

The Senate met later when Sir Oliver Mowat urged delay in the investigation till next session. He made a statement showing that nothing would be done by the government in the meantime to commit the country to the Drummond County Railway lease. He said that he was authorized to state (1) that the vote for rolling stock would be reduced to one-half; (2) that the Government undertook to purchase no rolling stock from the Drummond people; (3) that no step would be taken to commit the Government or Parliament in any way to go on with the Intercolonial project. Anything said by the members in the other chamber implying that the ministry was determined to go on with the original programme sooner or later, was withdrawn and he had full authority to say so. The Minister of Justice gave a full assurance that Parliament would be left entirely free to deal, next year, with the subject as if nothing had been done.

On this assurance, Sir McKenzie consented to postpone the inquiry.

At an early hour the House got through with the legislation that it was proposed to put through.

In the Senate the Field Loan Bill was read a third time and passed. The railway subsidies bill was passed through all its stages with some discussion.

A debate took place on the Crow's Nest bill.

The supply bill also went through its final stages and by six o'clock the chamber was ready for the Governor-General. He arrived at 8 o'clock and the prorogation took place.

THE BRITISH PARLIAMENT.

Opposition Takes Advantage of the Garden Party.

Government Defeated on Trifling Issues.

LONDON June 30.—The Garden Party at Buckingham Palace stripped the House of Commons yesterday. As a consequence the government was thrice defeated. Mr. Balfour then moved and adjournment saying that it was difficult to do business during the Jubilee celebration. The motion was rejected. Many of the government supporters having come back from the garden party Wm. Balfour again moved to adjourn and the motion carried. The previous divisions were obviously trifling issues and do not affect the position of the government.

TRAGEDY IN A CHURCH.

Two Men Shot Dead and One Mortally Wounded

One of the most sensational tragedies ever enacted in North Texas took place in the Methodist Episcopal church in Pleasant Valley, Dallas county, 22 miles north of Dallas City, in the course of the services last Sunday. As a result Augustine Garrison and Frank John are dead and Thomas Jones probably fatally wounded. The Garrison and the Jones families are among the most prominent planters in this section of Texas. They own adjoining plantations and have been on the best of social relations for many years. Augustus Garrison was a married man and had a daughter sixteen years old named Lois. The Jones brother, were single. Frank Jones for a year or more had been very partial in his attentions to Garrison's daughter. Recently the girl charged him with having ruined her under promise of marriage. Garrison swore he would have the life of the betrayer of his daughter. Mutual friends succeeded in keeping the men apart until Sunday, when the first meeting between them took place. Garrison and the Jones family worship at the same church. Just as the preacher had taken his text after prayer and during the singing of a hymn Garrison, who had a seat near the door, stepped to the door, it is believed to get some fresh air, as the atmosphere in the building was oppressive. He had no more than reached the doorway when the congregation were startled by a fusillade of pistol shots. Nearly a dozen shots were fired in about as many seconds. When the firing ceased Augustus Garrison and Frank Jones were lying dead in front of the church steps and Thomas Jones was stretched on the lawn nearby, one hand clasped on his right thigh and in his left hand he had a pistol. His right thigh bone in front was shattered by a 42 calibre pistol ball that tore its way downward, mutilating the flesh for a distance of six inches. Frank Jones was shot three times, once in the region of the heart, once in the right side, and once on the head. Garrison received but one bullet and that pierced his heart. Neither man lived long enough to scarcely realize his fate.

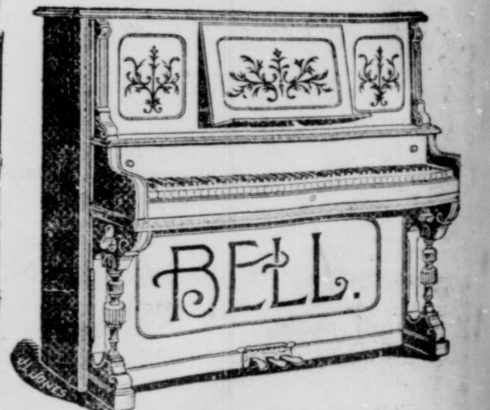
