The Opening of Parliament.

The introduction of new members took place amidst wild enthusiasm. The general hand-clapping and joyous outbursts that greeted Messrs Fairbairn, Hughes, and other conquering heroes of recent victories, were only equaled by those extended to Hon. Mr. Oumet, M. P. W. Hon. M. Laurier appeared sad, but in graceful, courteous and warm. None of his fighting allies were to be seen. His being severely alone caused words of sympathy and kind compassion to be freely uttered by on-lookers and the position and appearance of the overworked leader of a sinking cause.

The great Knight of battle was absent, as was also Messrs. Mills, Mulock and Charlton, with no Ananias Cameron, Burton or Spohn to do duty. A fact that added much to the more than ordinary respectability and prominence extended the formidable Dr. Landerkin and Perry the Noble, who, by long experience and being now present in the flesh at their desks, are graded up considerably, and attract the notice of strangers in the sparsely occupied territory to the speaker's left.

Such was the decision given by the numerous gods from the elevated seats.

In kind consideration on the part of the Government for Hon. Mr. Laurier's sudden illness on Friday, the ring, seconding and discussion on the address was laid over until Monday.

A most gloomy display of empty chairs marks the desert waste in the Commons to the speakers left at present. Some sympathy is expressed for the fallen warriors, who were slain in the recent by-elections. Whilst the sympathy so expressed may be of left handed species, yet the brigade that knew and charged so much, are gone, whilst there is not even a barren hope of ever again having a similar outpouring of forcible and fighting men in the Commons of Canada.

Diphtheria.

It is pleasing to learn that diphtheria in Murray River is pretty well stamped out. The latest advices state that there is now but one case there, and that it will probably be one of recovery. We congratulate the physicians and the people of Murray River on this result.

Diphtheria has been prevalent in several other sections of the country—including Summerside. The prompt action of physicians and people has, however, prevented it from spreading in such a way as to become epidemic.

A physician of repute in Summerside has informed our correspondent "Sanitas" that to ensure disinfection by means of burning sulphur it is necessary that the rooms and articles to be disinfected should be damped with water just before the process of fumigation is begun. This is a point to be noted.

Meeting at Cardigan North.

A large audience assembled at the school-house at Cardigan North on the evening of the 24th ult. for the purpose of forming a "Farmers' Trading Association"; also to discuss some important matters concerning such an association.

Michael Sweeney, Esq., was appointed chairman, and the undersigned secretary.

W. P. Lewis, Esq., being called upon, arose and in a very able and instructive address expressed his views concerning such an union. Such a movement is also utterly necessary for improving the present condition of the farmers. The chief grievance exists in the shipping from Three Rivers—especially from Cardigan. The following resolution was proposed:

Whereas, Of late years the prices received by farmers in this section of the country for produce have not been altogether satisfactory.

Therefore resolved, That by-laws be framed and a constitution formed, and a board of directors appointed with power to ship—each school district having its own director.

As regards the measuring of our produce, it was proposed that the Association keep a man on board each vessel to tally and look after all other interests of the farmer.

The purchase of machinery required by the farmers was also discussed, and the following proposal made that at a period before the machinery is required, the association will be ready and willing to obtain the same, at the manufacturers' prices and with as little expense as possible.

Mr. Lewis is a practical speaker and goes a right into the subject with ut many preliminary remarks.

The proposals were ably supported by Thos. Garland, Innocent Campbell, Rodger Campbell, G. Orff Goff and S. Johnston. It was also proposed that a meeting for the purpose be held on the 1st inst, at DeGross Marsh. Mr. Lewis was invited to address the meeting.

A vote of thanks was tendered Mr. Lewis for his instructive address, also to Mr. Sweeney for the able manner in which he conducted the meeting.

News Notes.

A crazy shoemaker named Revell, living at Broadworth, England, killed his four children a few days ago by cutting their throats. He then attempted to kill himself.

Famine prevails in Northern Hungary. Twenty thousand people in the county of Arva are in great distress. The government will not relieve the sufferers because they are of the Slav race. German newspapers in Pesth indignantly protest against this inhumanity.

It is now estimated 40,000 English miners will cease work in a fortnight in their efforts to prevent masters from putting into effect a scheme to reduce wages. The branch industries will also be affected. Nearly one million men will feel the effects of the miners' struggle. The price of coal is rapidly rising in London.

A Vienna reporter who accompanied a relief committee on their rounds witnessed many scenes of abject poverty and misery. While families are living and working in a single room, earning a few shillings per week. Many shocking cases of sweating were brought to light.

A general feeling of uneasiness prevails throughout Indianapolis, Ind. In view of the anticipated rioting by street car strikers and sympathizers some 500 special police have been sworn in. The company will attempt to run cars. Two special policemen were mobbed by 2,000 people on Washington street. They were rescued in a dispirited condition and hidden away. The streets are packed with people.
