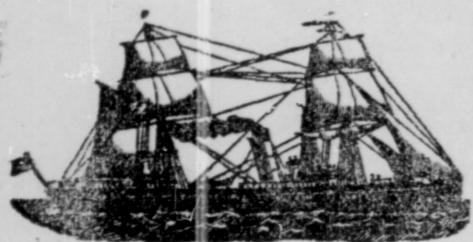

LAST YEAR'S EXPENDITURE.

REVISED returns show the expenditure for the fiscal year ending June 30th last to have been:—

On ordinary account.....\$41,760,312
On capital account..... 9,134,434

Total.....\$50,894,746

This is a vaster expenditure than has been. And the men who made it continuously denounced the Conservatives because they made it \$10,000,000 or \$12,000,000 less per year. Extravagance and inconsistency marks the career of the false Liberals in office.

BLACK SAM'S BRIDGE.

We hope that our City Councillors will, each and all, walk out to Black Sam's Bridge now, when its rottenness is laid bare, and see for themselves the necessity of a new structure.

It is true, of course, that the Provincial Government ought to assist in the repair of this public thoroughfare because it is required by the travelling public of the Province at large. But there ought to be no haggling about the matter. If the Provincial Government will not bear a share of the expense, the City Government must, for the credit of Charlottetown and the safety of the public, have a new bridge built next year.

A sketch plan according to which the bridge and the pond may be improved was prepared some time ago by Mr. W. C. Harris, A. R. C. A. Would it not be well to examine this plan with a view to the beginning of the work early in the spring?

We have little doubt that the owners of the property in the vicinity would cooperate in the work. The property is at present disgraceful to them as well as to the city.

A COMPARISON

THERE can be no doubt that the taxpayers of this country, the farmers and other producing classes in Canada, were led to expect, and did expect, a substantial decrease of expenditure upon the accession of the Liberal party.

We are enabled to make a comparison of three year's expenditures by the Conservatives and three year's expenditures by the Liberals now in office, and to see how these expectations have been fulfilled:

\$46,069,000, or close upon \$5,000,000 per year upon the average more than the Conservatives.

That is to say that in the Liberal period of three years \$15,000,000 more of the taxpayers' money was spent than in the previous three years in which the expenditures were controlled by Conservatives!

When the enormous expenditures of the current year come to be included, the comparison will be still more odious to the Liberals.

The question in the meantime is, what will the taxpayers do about it—at the first opportunity?

NOTES AND COMMENTS

—The Montreal market is reported more active and firmer for butter and cheese.

—A case of bubonic plague is reported at Asuncion, the capital of Paraguay. The disease must have reached there by way of Buenos Ayres or Montevideo which are in direct communication with United States and Canadian ports.

—The Empire, of London, asserts that the burgher in the Transvaal attaches no more importance to the warnings of British statesmen than he would to the menaces of Bunn, chief of the Swazis. The burghers know they could put down Bunn with ease, and they believe they are more than a match for the redcoats. This idea, we believe, is at the bottom of Oom Paul's dallying.

—The London Daily Chronicle, which has been friendly towards Kruger, says:—"We regret that the Boers, by rejecting a fair offer, made in fair language, have taken a line giving fresh point to the argument of their enemies—that President Kruger is a shifty and impracticable politician, fit only to be spoken to across a line of bayonets."

—THE EXAMINER has received the Canadian Home Journal, containing the prospectus of the Canadian Home Journal Company. This company is endeavoring to provide for Canadians good literature of purely Canadian origin, and it certainly deserves the support of the Canadian public. The intention of the promoters of the Canadian Home Journal is to provide a publication that will be received and appreciated by all true Canadians who are desirous of supporting and encouraging Canadian literature in preference to publications printed and published elsewhere.

—The Leader of the Opposition in Manitoba promises that if he is given control of the province he will introduce legislation requiring an educational test before people are allowed to vote. His idea is to prevent the Anglo-Saxon population of the prairie province from being swamped by immigration from continental Europe. It is not suggested that ability to read English is proof of an intelligent comprehension of our institutions, but it is almost the only test that can be insisted upon. It is not proposed to disfranchise any person who was born in this country, no matter what his lack of educational advantages may have been.

—A writer in the Atlantic Monthly thus describes the results of missionary work and official administration among the Indians: "Bishop Hare, who has devoted his life to the uplifting of the Indian in the diocese of the two Dakotas, tells of a dozen Indian clergymen and more than fifty deacons and catechists engaged in missionary work among the Sioux alone and 1,600 Indian communicants in the Episcopal church. The Indian women in his diocese contributed in one year \$2,000 for missionary purposes. There are 33,000 Sioux, and 8,000 are members of various churches. The Presbyterians, working among the Indians in other parts of the country, report nearly 5,000 church members and 4,000 enrolled in their Sunday schools, who gave in one year for missions \$2,600, besides \$3,400 toward their own support. Equally encouraging are reports from other denominations in all parts of the field where the national policy of making self-supporting citizens has taken root. The aggregate of church communicants is 28,351."

RACES AT SOURIS.—Races will be held at the Souris Driving Park on Wednesday, Oct. 4th. The following are the events: Three minute class, \$50; Green Race, purse \$30; also a bicycle race. There will be a match race between the stallions Progress Lad, Prospector and Prince Regent, for \$150. Entrance money 10 per cent. of purse. National rules to govern races.
