NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—Yes! \$3,000,000 will help Mr. Greenway out in the coming election.

—A mother in the United States has raised the cry that the American soldiers are being starved. Very like a mother.

—In the House of Commons, a few days ago, an address to Lord Aberdeen was unanimously passed expressive of high appreciation of the unfailing courtesy and assiduous care with which he had presided over the affairs of the country, and appreciation of the interest he has taken in the advancement and welfare of the people, irrespective of class or creed, as well as the interest he has taken in science, art and literature.

—The Halifax Herald refers again to the act of our legislature which interferes between creditor and debtor and says: "There are few who consider this repudiation act of Prince Edward Island constitutional. Not a merchant in Halifax but believes it ultra vires of the local legislature. But in order to avoid the necessity of litigation to decide this point efforts are commencing to be made to have the law disallowed. The council of the Halifax Board of Trade discussed the question, and has memorialized the Dominion government on the subject. The Maritime Commercial Travellers' Association, through its secretary, has done the same thing. At the last monthly meeting of the Dominion Commercial Travellers' Association the secretary announced that in compliance with a resolution of a special committee, which met a few days ago, this matter had been brought to the attention of the department of justice at Ottawa, and a request made that the objectionable act be disallowed. The department has acknowledged receipt of the communication, and promised attention."

ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.

New York Tribune: "The volunteers who think that \$13 per month is small pay may find consolation in the knowledge that the common soldier in Russia receives three rubles per annum—about \$2.25. The day rations consist of two pounds of suet, which is a very coarse kind of bread made of cracked rye, baked hard at first, then cut into small pieces and further dried in a heated oven; a small quantity of salt, and some soup."

Ottawa Journal: Both loud and long have been the complaints in the United States press that the American admirals and generals are hampered by the orders of the "Board of Strategy," which from Washington controls the plan of the war. And yet Admiral Cervera could hardly have done worse if there had been a Spanish Board of Strategy.

Toronto Globe: It is not necessary that the improved relations between Great Britain and the United States should take the form of an alliance, of a treaty in black and white, in articles and codicils. It is not necessary that the republic should involve itself in wars in India, or in South Africa. A question may arise in which the English speaking communities may fight side by side for a common cause; but in the meantime all that is required is the steady growth of friendly feeling. With nations whose relations are so close there must be either friendship, or danger or hostility; there cannot be indifference.

BEHRING SEA AWARD.

United States to Make Provision for Payment of Illegal Seizures.

OTTAWA, June 8.—Sir Louis Davies announced yesterday that the United States will make provision for the amount of the award which it has been called upon to pay for illegal seizure of Canadian sealing vessels by an item in its Appropriation Bill, instead of by a special bill for the purpose. This course is adopted for the purpose of escaping undue delay, and possibly the defeat of the proposition.

If the successful Canadian applicants for damages do not contribute anything towards the cost, the expense which this country will have to meet on account of the Behring Sea arbitration will be \$70,000, less \$8,000 which Great Britain has agreed to pay. The sum of \$62,000 has already been voted, of which \$49,644 has been expended up to date. The Government will consider whether the country will pay the whole \$70,000, or whether the successful litigants shall contribute a portion of the cost.

There are now 32 shoe factories in the City of Quebec, exclusive of those in the suburbs of Levis and Loretta. The factories range from small places, capable of turning out 100 pairs per day, to huge establishments with a capacity of from 2,000 to 3,000 pairs daily. In Quebec there are about 30,000 pairs of boots and shoes manufactured every day and 9,000,000 pairs yearly.

PRESBYTERIANS IN CANADA.

Annual Report of the General Assembly.

The annual report of the Presbyterian General Assembly which met in Montreal on Wednesday evening, has been issued. The following resolutions are placed before the assembly for discussion:—

1 That the assembly renew with emphasis its injunction to presbyteries to be careful, prompt and faithful in having returns from all the charges, whether vacant or settled, and stations in their hands procured and forwarded to the committee in good time, as required by previous injunctions of the Supreme Court. That presbyteries have reported to them by their clerk or convener of their committee on statistics the returns made, and that they spend some time considering the same.

(2) The general assembly recommends to presbyteries and sessions to take suitable measures for celebrating the 250th anniversary of the completion of the confession of faith and catechism by the Westminster assembly of divines.

(3) That, owing to the defective form in which some of the applications are sent up to the general assembly, it be an instruction to presbyteries to have regard in their applications to the provisions of the act on the reception of ministers.

(4) That presbyteries and sessions be urged anew to bring before all parents and guardians of youth the supreme importance of family religion, and strive to roll away from professedly Christian homes the reproach of neglected family altars. That presbyteries be strongly recommended to adopt some form of presbyterial visitation, with the special design of promoting the spiritual life of the people.

5. That the assembly renew its instruction of some years ago to presbyteries to see that ministers at ordination are reminded of this fund, and of the desirability of their connecting themselves with it.

6. That it be an instruction to clerks of presbyteries in the case of the decease of each minister to send an obituary notice to the clerk of the general assembly for its use, and to send a copy of such notice to the Presbyterian Record.
