## Island Red Cross Division Very Active, Reports Show

### SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN

The work of the P.E.I. Division of the Canadian Red Cross Society was described in committee reports presented at the society's semi-annual meeting in Summerside last night at a well attended supper meeting in Mulberry Lodge.

D. Bruce Shaw, chairman of National Executive Committee, Toronto, spoke to the meeting on the International Junior Red Cross Study Center held at Toronto this year.

Judge J.S. DesRoches, president of the P.E.I. Division, presided at the meeting and Mr. Shaw was introduced by the vice-president Gordon MacDonald.

In reporting on the study centre at Toronto this year, Mr. Shaw said that 174 delegates and 31 adult leaders had attended, representing 50 of the 84 countries in the League and he pointed out that the League of Red Cross Societies actually hands more nations together in its work than does the United Nations.

The reports of the various provincial Red Cross committees revealed the extent of society work throughout Prince Edward Island.

### 140 AIDED

Robert Younker, reporting for the disaster services committee, said there are now 10 disaster units on the Island, the latest one having been organized at Tignish. He said Red Cross assistance had been provided to 28 homes where losses had been suffered from fire, and that in this project 140 persons had been aided.

Kenneth A. Parker, reporting for the committee on Junior Red Cross, said that the junior groups have been organized in 227 classrooms in the Charlottetown area, seven high school groups had been formed, and some 35 schools had already become active in Junior Red Cross work this fall.

Mr. Parker introduced Miss Muriel St. John who had been an Island representative at the international workshop. Miss St. John described one of the interesting experiences she had enjoyed at this conference and in association with Junior Red Cross members from other countries.

### FIRST AID CLASSES

Mrs. Evelyn Cudmore, reporting for the first aid committee, said that 39 first aid classes had been trained, and that 617 people had received first aid certificates. She said 13 communities have already requested first aid classes for this season.

She said 38 first aid posts are located at various parts of the Island throughout the year, and serve both highway accident needs and community first aid requirements and Red Cross services.

Lt. Col. E.W. Johnstone was thanked by Judge DesRoche for the contributions made to the Red Cross through the "wishing well" at his Woodleigh replicas farm, which amounted to \$448.20 this year.

## Bank Interest Drops Again

OTTAWA (CP) — The Bank of Canada interest rate declined for the third week in a row Thursday by a quarter of one per cent to 5.50 with the sale of \$100,000,000 in 91-day government treasury bills.

The bank announced that Thursday's sale of treasury bills brought an average price of \$98.709 with an average yield of 5.25 per cent compared to 5.50 per cent last week.

## Six Sea Cow Pond Men Face Fisheries Charge

SUMMERSIDE — Six fisheries cases were before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in county magistrate's court in Summerside yesterday, all of them involving the possession of lobsters at Sea Cow Pond during a closed season.

One of these men, Melvin Buote was fined \$25 and costs of \$7.30. Four others, Edgar Clarence Gavin, Victor Joseph Buote, Atwood Joseph Gavin, and Edward Joseph Arseneault, all pleaded not guilty and had their cases adjourned to Wednesday, October

21. The sixth man, Jerry Buote, also pleaded not guilty, and trial was commenced this morning. William Reddin is counsel for the fisheries department, and Buote is represented by J. Watson MacNaught, Q.C.
