

## New Secret Dye Injection Used For Burn Treatment

MELBOURNE, Australia (AP)—There have been green men around the military re-patriation hospital in the Melbourne suburb of Heidelberg since doctors applied a revolutionary new method of treating severe burns and bone infections.

For the first time outside England, a new secret dye was injected recently into a pa-

tient's bloodstream. The unidentified man, suffering from chest burns, turned green as the dye circulated through the bloodstream. But the tissue destroyed by the burns retained its normal color and enabled surgeons to determine just what flesh to remove. Dr. Herbert I. Gibbs, medical superintendent, said the man turned deep green all over.

Hospital patients said he looked "like an apparition from the horror film."

The green color began to fade after two days and the man soon was back to his normal color.

Doctors said the dye was used on a second unidentified patient suffering from a bone infection. The diseased bone remained white while the healthy bones became green.

Surgeons again knew precisely what portions of the bone to remove but said they found it an unsettling experience to

operate with green blood oozing from the incisions.

Both men were said to have been horrified when they first saw themselves in mirrors.

The dye's formula, still secret, was discovered by an English doctor, who is compiling case histories of its effects before publishing details.

**SEAPORT CLOSED**

A token protest strike of 10,000 dock and factory workers paralyzed the Kerala seaport of Cochin. The strikers paraded through the streets of Cochin and nearby Ernakulam shouting slogans against the government.

Here in the state capital, police detained more than 70 campaigners demonstrating outside government offices and trying to push their way inside.

Prime Minister Nehru's National Congress party intervened in the dispute Monday with a call for the resignation of the Communist government.

**RESULT OF VISIT**

The communists achieved power in Kerala elections 26 months ago. The only Communist-governed state in India also has the highest rate of literacy—more than 40 per cent of the 15,000,000 population can read and write.

ST. ANDREWS, N.B. — Since the appointment Dr. Reid Loggie as regional supervisor of the Department of Fisheries' fish culture service in the Maritimes, the work of oyster research at the Ellerslie, P.E.I., oyster culture station has been carried on by R.E. Drinnan.

The biological sub-station at Ellerslie is within the jurisdiction of Dr. J.L. Hart, director of the Fisheries Research Board of Canada's biological station at Brandy Cove near St. Andrews, N.B. Prior to his new appointment, Dr. Loggie was officer-in-charge of the oyster research centre.

Mr. Drinnan, a native of England, is a graduate of University College, London. He holds a bachelor's degree in zoology. Following graduation he was on the scientific staff of the U.K. Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries.

Before coming to Canada last year Mr. Drinnan served two years in the Royal Navy. During his navy career he learned the

Russian language and he served as an interpreter of that language.
