INQUEST POSTPONED - The inquest into the death of Mr. Emmett Callaghan of St. Louis, which was to have been held last evening, has been postponed to Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock in the Alberton Court House.

Panel Discussion M. Clarke, assistant chief Health Officer, N.B.; Dr. L. G. Dewar, O'Leary, P.E.I.; Mrs. J. Gordon MacDonald, president of the P.E.I. Home and School Association and Mrs. W. E. MacKinnon, Ugg, P.E.I., national convener, Health and Home Economics, Federated Women's Institutes of Canada. Mrs. MacKinnon felt that too many victims of chronic diseases are now in hospital. She was of the opinion that physical examinations and educational program should be included in the plan and made available to low income groups. Mrs. MacDonald said that preventive medicine was closely tied in with education and a better understanding of health and co-operation should be sought. Dr. Dewar touched on the problem of rural preventive medicine in relation to private practice. He believed that preventive medicine should be carried out, mostly by the private practitioner. It was important he said for patients to have routine check-ups within certain age groups and for certain diagnoses. Dr. Clarke discussed the problem from the standpoint of voluntary health insurance. He emphasized the fact that it must be known what is in the best interests of the patient. He queried whether such a plan is economically possible. Dr. Clarke stressed the importance of an education program using as an example the T. B. program. He felt that routine check-ups and immunization clinics would be the means of eliminating many expensive features. Dr. J. A. MacMillan in summing up some of the needs in preventive medicine said that they were four in number: 1. Periodic examinations; 2. Diagnosis; 3. Inoculations; 4. A broad education program. He said that such a program would have several problems such as heavy subsidization, which is undertaken by the Federal Government would take ten per cent of the National gross income. He felt that pre-paid coverage either factual or realistic would not be attainable in the near future, since people are not ready to accept the idea of transferring part of their income to health payments.

Claims Successful Treatment of Polio TOKYO (AP) - A Japanese doctor claims extremely successful results with a treatment for paralytic polio. Dr. Hideo Sato told Kyodo news agency he has used a new drug on nine patients. He said an 11-year-old boy and a four-year-old girl, crippled by polio, were able to walk in less than a month of treatment. Dr. Sato said he used adrenocortical hormones, strengthened with special vitamins derived from B-2. He found the drug, in tablet form, helped improve the blood circulation in the paralyzed part of the body. The doctor cautioned, however, that it is still too early to say definitely whether his treatment is permanently effective.

Sentenced To Hang July 28 SUDBURY (CP) - Robert Bruce Ducharme, 23, of Hamilton, was convicted Friday of murder in the shooting last December of Steve Klapouschak, 21-year-old school teacher, at Dalton Mills. He was sentenced to be hanged July 28. Mr. Justice D. P. J. Kelly imposed the death sentence at the end of the five-day trial in Ontario Supreme Court. Klapouschak, who let Ducharme share his living quarters at the school house in the bush country hamlet 23 miles northwest of here, was found dead Dec. 4. His frozen, bullet-riddled body lay hidden under a woodpile beside the school.

Smouldering Cigaret Butt Dangerous LONDON (Reuters) - British scientists believe that a cigarette butt casually thrown away could cause a fire several years later. They said in a report on industrial fires published Friday that a burning cigarette buried under a pile of dust or waste could continue to smoulder through to the surface for a period proportionate to the size of the heap. It had been calculated that with such a dust pile 50 feet deep, it might take three or four years for the unsuspected smouldering to reach the open and start a sudden blaze.

Chiropractors Name Officers TORONTO (CP) - Gilbert H. Young of Vancouver Friday was elected president of the Canadian Chiropractic Association, succeeding Lloyd D. McPhail of Winnipeg. The election came at a meeting of the group's national directors preceding the association's two-day convention which starts today. H. H. Byerstein of Edmonton and A. L. Short of New Glasgow, N.S., were re-elected executive directors.

Burlesque Ban In N. Y. Lifted NEW YORK (AP) - The 18-year-old ban on "burlesque" in New York City has been lifted by court order - but the shows apparently won't be what they used to be. State Supreme Court Justice Aron Steuer has cleared the way for a producer to display the burlesque signs that were ruled out in 1937 when the shows got too raw. Thomas J. Phillips, executive director of the Burlesque Artist Association, promised the shows would be "clean" and "family-type" - without the bumps, grinds, strip teasers and smutty jokes that got burlesque into trouble back in the 1930s.

Arctic Currents Affecting Newfoundland Conditions ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) - A receding polar ice cap and diminishing Arctic currents may be having wider effects on Newfoundland than most people realize. A Portuguese fishing captain here thinks the Arctic currents are responsible for a shift among the fish population of Newfoundland waters. A transport official suggests they are greatly affecting the weather, and health department officials say the changes may be responsible for an upswing in virus diseases. Capt. Gilberto Morgado of the ship Jao Alvarez Fegundes says codfish appear to be moving away from the Grand banks in favor of cooler water near Greenland. At the same time he said more had-dock are being found on the Grand banks, and they like warmer water. Pollock, distant relative of the cod, are also moving into the Grand bank area.

AFFECT BAROMETERS Capt. R. J. Randall of the transport department says that barometers can't predict weather changes here anymore. Ten years ago, he says, barometers were always right; now they are usually wrong. Since the Arctic current has diminished, warm winds are penetrating inland, making radical changes in weather. And provincial meteorologists say this warm wind may be the cause of a definite upswing in virus diseases this year. But so far, they say, this is only speculation. Weather officials are quick to point out that any changes don't appear to be improving conditions. In January records were shattered as the province was hit by fog, rain, sleet, winds and snow. Besides, this year saw the heaviest snowfall since 1894.

PICTON, Ont. (CP) - Five racehorses were burned to death Thursday night when fire destroyed a \$15,000 barn at Picton Fairground, 20 miles east of Belleville. Fire departments from Picton and Bloomfield fought the blaze while farmers made repeated efforts to free the trapped animals.

Three Ministers Oppose Move To Reaffirm Vows SHERBROOKE, Que. (CP) - Three district United Church ministers have taken issue with a church recommendation that ministers reaffirm their ordination vows and reconsecrate themselves to their work. Dr. L. M. Outerbridge of Lennoxville United Church, Rev. T. D. F. Everett, Trinity United and Dr. J. E. Boucher, Sangster Memorial, were interviewed on the recommendation during the weekend. The United Church of Canada announced in Toronto Thursday a three-phase plan of rededication of church ministers, workers and members. Ministers would be asked to reaffirm this fall their ordination vows and to reconsecrate themselves to the work of the ministry. VOWS WERE PERMANENT "Absolute foolery," said Dr. Outerbridge. "My vows were holy and permanent and were to last as long as I live. I am definitely not going to take them again." The implication of the proposal was that he might have forgotten his vows, said Dr. Outerbridge. Dr. Everett said reaffirmation of ordination vows would be like getting married again. "It is neither necessary nor reasonable and I'm not going to do it," he said. "And I expect strong reaction elsewhere too." Dr. Boucher expressed uncertainty as to what exactly was meant by the recommendation "but if that's what it means, I for one will refuse to take my vows again."
