MACDONALD SLOYD SCHOOLS!

Manual Training For Maritime Provinces. The movement to introduce manual training into the public schools in each of the provinces of Canada under the Macdonald Sloyd School Fund has been most successful as far as it has gone. The school at Fredericton, N. B., was opened in April and continued until the end of June. It has been most highly spoken of by the educational authorities of New Brunswick as well as by the parents and pupils themselves. SUMMER SESSION FOR TEACHERS. In order that teachers in the Maritime Provinces may have an opportunity of seeing for themselves the nature of this instruction and in some cases of preparing themselves to take it up in their schools, Professor Robertson has decided to provide a summer course for teachers at Fredericton. The instruction will be free, and both men and women teachers will be accepted. The course will be begun on July 16th and last for about six weeks. All those who desire to enter should make immediate application to Mr. E. E. MacCreedy, Manual Training Instructor, Fredericton, New Brunswick. The use of a room in the Normal School building, at Fredericton has been granted for the purpose of this summer course in Manual Training by the courtesy of the Educational authorities there. Mr. MacCreedy will endeavor to obtain a list of suitable and convenient boarding places for such teachers as may apply. After the summer holidays, Manual Training courses are to be provided under the Macdonald Sloyd Fund at Truro, N. S., and at Charlottetown and Summerside, P. E. Island. Ottawa, July 4th. 1900.
