Tony had some good company in the screwball category with Carnera and the Baer brothers. Their antics inside and outside the ring made Cassius Clay and Archie Moore look like amateurs. Tony was asked about his 1939 fight with Louis. "Nova was the No. 1 contender," he replied. "I give him a terrible beating. I knock him down about 20 times before they stop the fight. "I just accidentally throw a punch when he's going down in the fourth round and my finger gets caught in his eye. I can't apologize because he is taking the count at the time. "I was out drinking all night before the fight. "He keeps thumbing me so I say to him 'All right, you thumb me, I thumb you. You butt me, I butt you.' "Yeah, I give him a good beating. "But the Louis fight? "I tell you, I give that Nova a good beating. 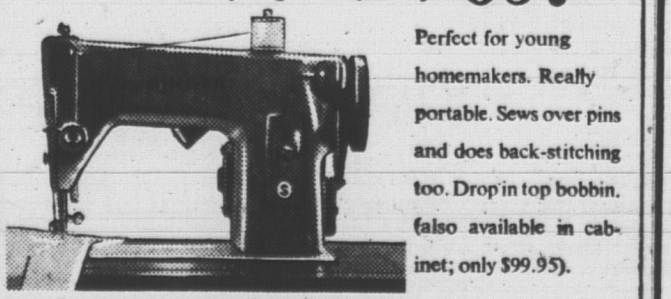
