[Feb 4 eod wky] A BAD accident occurred on the corner of Water and Queen Streets, shortly after eleven o'clock this forenoon, as a result of which Mr. Stephen Cummings, laborer, lost his life. He was engaged in hauling salt with a sloop and pair of horses, when the sloop slipped and fell between the wheels. The horses started, and the rear wheel went over the man, breaking into fragments the bones of the lower portion of the body over which it passed. He was immediately conveyed to the Charlottetown Hospital, but his injuries were so serious that he died fifteen minutes after arrival. His remains were removed to his late residence on Sidney Street, at one o'clock. He was about 60 years of age, and leaves a wife and large family to mourn his untimely death. THE Rome correspondent of the Boston Pilot says that at the celebration of the Feast of St. Patrick in St. Leonard's, the Church of the Irish Franciscans in Rome, Mr. Gracelli, Archbishop of Colosco, sang the High Mass, and Mgr. Cornelius O'Brien, Archbishop of Halifax, N. S., preached the sermon. With admirable clearness and powerful reasoning, Mgr. O'Brien showed the obligations of Faith, and the influence it exercised throughout the English speaking world through the Apostolate of the Irish race. Referring to the demand now made for liberty by the Irish people, the Archbishop expressed his confidence in the future of the Irish people, and in their providential mission as the restorers of social order in the Europe of the future. The Church was filled by the Irish, American and English residents and travellers. THE SALMON SEASON.—The Pacific coast salmon season has begun on the Sacramento river, but there has been little news so far except that the run is very light. On the Columbia, fishermen have fixed prices at 65c a fish for cannery boats and 75c a fish for outside boats. From a production of over 1,100,000 cases in 1883, the pack dropped to 885,000 cases in 1885, the shortage being mainly on the Columbia and Sacramento. The outlook for the 1886 pack it is as yet impossible to figure upon, but it is probable that Alaska may come to the front, with larger supplies than usual. A year ago the price of salmon was down to 90c, while the market is now firm at \$1.02 1/2 to \$1.05, with very little old stock on hand. Firm prices and a clear market induce renewed activity in this season's salmon trade.—Bradstreet. LETTERS TO THE EDITOR. The Angle Trisected. SIR.—I see in yesterday's issue of THE EXAMINER, an intended solution of the problem to trisect an angle, which I consider is not correct. The solution fails in the assumption that arcs of a circle are to one another as their chords, for if two equal arcs be taken contiguous to one another, they will be cut off by equal chords; but if a chord be drawn to the whole arc it will not be double of one of the smaller chords, because any side of a triangle is less than the other two. EUCLID Why Chamberlain Objects. The following is a written statement by Mr. Chamberlain of his reasons for opposing Mr. Gladstone's measure:—"Mr. Gladstone's scheme for the disruption of the United Kingdom is not likely to commend itself either in its principle or its details to democratic sentiment. Its leading idea is opposed to the tendency of the great movement, which, during the present century, has done so much to obliterate differences and distinctions, and weld together communities and nations in closer bonds of amity and interest. United Italy and United Germany constitute a silent protest against an attempt to split into fragments the present organization of the United Kingdom. The principle of federation, triumphantly vindicated by the democracies of America and the Swiss republic, and successfully imitated in the internal government of the Dominion of Canada, has been recognized as the means whereby imperial unity can be conciliated with local independence. Mr. Gladstone, however, has shown upon many occasions, and conspicuously in his utterances at the time of the American civil war, that he is prepared to carry decentralization to extreme limits, and that he regards without enthusiasm the idea of imperial unity, coupled as it must always be with imperial responsibilities and obligations. But, if in his conception of national duty he is opposed by democratic aspirations, he is still more out of harmony with radical opinion in the constructive details of his great scheme. In order to provide safeguards, which he recognizes as essential for the protection of minorities, the maintenance of social order, and the security of civil and religious liberty, Mr. Gladstone seeks the English and Scotch Liberals to consent to taxation without representation, to the inclusion of Peers as ex-officio members of a representative assembly, to property qualification, both for electors and elected, and to an elaborate system of minority representation. These are the necessary concomitants of his proposal, and the plan must stand condemned as much on account of the anomalies which it brings in its train as from its inherent defects. The more carefully it is studied the more probable it is that neither in the United Kingdom, nor on the continent of Europe, nor in America will it receive the general approval of the Radical party." The official year book of the Church of England shows that, during the last twenty-five years, the Church has raised and spent for religious and educational purposes the sum of \$407,866,183.
