## CONTRACT BRIDGE

### FAMOUS HANDS

South dealer.  
Neither side vulnerable.

**NORTH**  
♠ Q 9 2  
♥ K Q 10 6 3 2  
♦ K J 10  
♣ A K J 10 9 7 5

**EAST**  
♠ 10 8 7 4 3

The bidding:  
South West North East  
1♥ 5♥ 5♣ 5♦

Opening lead—king of spades. Our nomination for the Oscar for one of the most fascinating and best-played hands of the year goes to Ralph Hirschberg, nationally known New York star, who became declarer at five hearts doubled in the accompanying deal. The hand was played in the South Jersey Championships held last month in Atlantic City.

West cashed the king of spades and shifted to the nine of diamonds. East took the ace and returned a spade, ruffed in dummy. It was obvious to declarer that East had to have all five missing trumps if his double was to be believed. The problem was how to do East out of his apparently sure trump trick.

Laying his plans accordingly, Hirschberg led the nine of hearts. East, conscious that the nine would very likely be finessed if he ducked, covered with the ten to protect his trump holding.

Hirschberg won with the jack, led a diamond to the king, and ruffed a diamond. He then cashed three club tricks, ending in dummy, to bring about this position:

West East  
♠ 10 8 7 4 3 ♠ 10 8 7 4 3  
♥ A 2 7 ♥ A 2 7  
♦ 7 3 2 ♦ 7 3 2  
♣ A Q 8 ♣ A Q 8

A diamond was led from dummy. East could not afford to ruff with the three since declarer would overruff with the six, trump the spade with the queen, and make the last two tricks with the A-K of trump.

So East trumped the diamond with the seven. Hirschberg overtrumped with the king. When the spade was now ruffed in dummy with the queen, East was compelled to undertruff with the three.

And when a diamond was then led from dummy, East's 8-4 of hearts were trapped by declarer's A-6.

Hirschberg had caused East's apparently invincible trump trick to disappear.

## Canadian Salesmen Scolded For Not Servicing Customers

OTTAWA (CP)—Two developments on Parliament Hill during the last week have pointed up a big gap in the facilities available to exporters in Canada, the world's fourth-largest trading nation.

The Commons resources committee was shaken when D. W. Ambridge, outspoken president of Abitibi Power and Paper Company, said Canada isn't doing "a damn thing" except take cash for exports.

Other countries are pushing their foreign trade through credit and barter deals, he said. The government should establish some body to study new methods of financing exports.

Meanwhile, with less fanfare, Parliament completed passage of a bill to set up a private company which plans to step into this field.

It is the Export Finance Corporation of Canada, Limited, which plans to start with a capital of \$50,000,000. A good part of its stock is expected to be taken up by Canadian banks and other financial institutions.

The company would operate in two broad fields: Lending to Canadian exporters to finance foreign sales of Canadian manufactured products and agricultural produce; and lending to foreign governments and corporations buying Canadian materials and services for capital projects abroad.

There is a Crown agency, the Export Credits Insurance Corporation, which will insure loans made to finance Canadian exports. The hitch has been that chartered banks have not felt able to provide export credit for the long periods required in many instances. The Crown agency itself does not make loans.

The situation was pointed up before the Commons on a banking committee by Stanley Stanger, an executive of the Guardian Trust Company of Montreal and one of the persons seeking incorporation of Export Finance Corporation.

He said a \$28,000,000 sale of Canadian wheat to Poland was being financed by West Germany because credit facilities weren't available in Canada.

Alfred T. Hurter, president of a Montreal engineering firm and

one of those interested in the company, appeared earlier before a Senate committee and cited several instances of export sales which were lost for lack of credit.

Egypt, he said, had wanted five-year credit on certain capital goods and although some Canadian manufacturers considered the invitation tender none was able to take on the job for lack of financing.

Further evidence to the Senate committee by Mr. Hurter, quoted in the Commons, was his estimate that in the last two years between \$6,000,000 and \$28,000,000 in foreign orders for heavy equipment had been lost by Canadian industry because this country had no credit corporation to handle the deals.

## Dulles Rated One Of Great

GETTYSBURG, Pa. (AP)—A sorrowing President Eisenhower Sunday eulogized John A. Foster Dulles as "one of the truly great men of our time"—a champion of freedom and foe of tyranny.

The president, at his farm for the weekend, received word of the passing of the former secretary of state as he was getting ready to attend services at the Gettysburg Presbyterian Church.

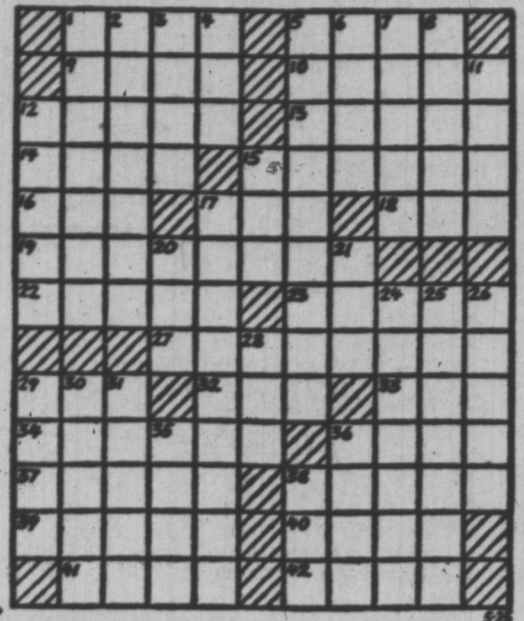
Eisenhower cancelled the church plans and sat down at his country home to write a tribute to Dulles, who was his close personal friend as well as his secretary of state for more than six years.

In his statement, Eisenhower said a lifetime of labor for world peace ended with Dulles' death at 71.

"His countrymen and all who believe in justice and the rule of law grieve at the passing from the earthly scene of one of the truly great men of our time. 'FOE ONLY TO TYRANNY'—Throughout his life, and particularly during his eventful six years as secretary of state, his courage, his wisdom and his friendly understanding were devoted to bettering relations among nations. He was a foe only to tyranny.

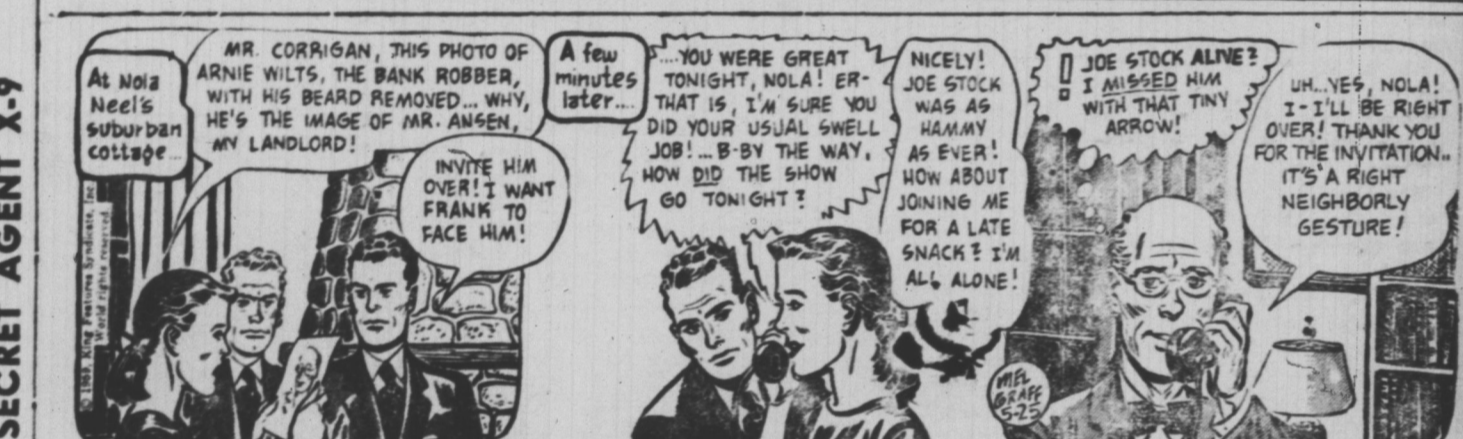
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
