

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

CANADIAN.

OTTAWA, Dec. 21.

"Canada first" is the name of a new weekly paper just started at Montreal. Several car loads of material arrived this week for the Dominion Sugar and Syrup Company.

The Council of the Montreal Board of Trade, at their meeting yesterday, resolved to petition the government in favor of repealing the law imposing stamp duties upon Bills of Exchange and Promissory Notes.

The Supreme Court Chamber, in the Parliament building, is being dismantled preparatory to the Court being transferred to the new Court House. The work of fitting the latter up for the use of the Court is progressing rapidly, and it is expected that it will be sufficiently far advanced for the Court to sit there when it re-assembles in January.

The consolidation of the Midland Railway, by which six separate lines have been brought under one management, was completed last Saturday. The road starting at Midland on Georgian Bay, takes in the lines already existing, connecting Orillia, Woodville, Lindsay, Omemee, Peterborough, North Hastings Junction and Madoc. From Madoc the road will be constructed to Perth and from there to Carleton Place, which gives them a direct route to Ottawa.

UNITED STATES.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.

The Guiteau trial was resumed to-day, without special incident. Dr. Hamilton, of New York, was examined for the prosecution relative to operations of mind, significance of dreams, and unconscious expressions as indicative of mental processes. Dr. Hamilton stated that there were many people medically insane who can distinguish between right and wrong, and can control their actions, and that this fact is recognized in nearly all asylums. Dr. Worcester, an expert on insanity, originally summoned for the defence came to Washington with the belief that Guiteau was insane, but had changed his opinion, and now considered him perfectly sane. Trial adjourned.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.

Ex-Senator Timothy O. Howe, of Wisconsin, was nominated and unanimously confirmed as Postmaster-General to-day. William H. Prescott was also confirmed as special Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to the South American Republics.

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Dec. 21.

The liabilities of R. Schloessen & Co., whose failure was announced, are stated to be 75,000 pounds.

ROME, Dec. 21.

The Foreign Secretary has addressed a memorial to the Committee on the Extradition Law Bill, stating that assassination, whether of sovereigns or chiefs, of states or others, can never be classed among crimes for which offenders can claim the right of asylum; and that extradition should always be granted in such cases.

DUBLIN, Dec. 21.

Earl Cowper, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, has selected E. Dwyer Gray as High Sheriff of Dublin for 1882.

LONDON, Dec. 21.

The crew of the steamer "Bath City," from Bristol for New York, spoken by the steamer "Marathia," Dec. 1st, off St. John's Nfld., have arrived at Liverpool. They were picked up off Newfoundland. The "Bath City" sprung a leak off Nfld., during heavy weather and sank. The crew 27 men, including the captain, took to the boats. One boat capsized and four occupants were drowned. The remaining 23 men were exposed to intense cold, from the effects of which the captain and five of the crew died. The survivors were three days and nights in boats in a deplorable condition.

LONDON, Dec. 21.

The brig "Elba," Bouteouche, N. B., for Liverpool, was abandoned on the 12th instant. Crew saved. The American ship "Iceberg" is ashore on the island of Banca.

ROME, Dec. 21.

The Senate yesterday adopted the clause of the Reform Bill, giving the right to vote to all who can read and write. The Senate afterwards adopted the whole Reform Bill.

LONDON, Dec. 21.

The first number of "United Ireland," published in London, made its appearance yesterday. It was printed from stereotype plates which escaped seizure in Dublin.

LONDON, Dec. 21.

It is stated that Thomas Power O'Connor will return at once from America to take the lead of the Irish party on the re-assembly of Parliament.

NEW YORK, Dec. 21.

A Lima letter, dated Nov. 16, to the Panama Star and Herald, has the following: "The rumors as to the visit of the 'Alaska,' which were rife last week, proved to have been founded on fact. She called at Mollendo and landed the brother of Garcia Calderon, who is said to have been the bearer of funds and instructions for the leaders of the revolution against Pierola. There seems to be truth in the statement, since directly after his arrival in that city, troops were marched in the direction of Ayacucho, the head quarters of Pierola, and his friends, and at present the capital of Peru in the eyes of his followers and all European diplomats, who never ceased to recognize him as the head of the Republic. The superior officers of the fleet are not at all satisfied at the duty given the 'Alaska' by Minister Horibut.
