

Local and Other Items.

THE FAIRBANKS FAMILY, will visit the Island about the end of this month.

THE potato bug is reported to be doing serious damage to the crop between Cape Tormentine and Cape Bald, N. B.

REV. MR COLLINGS, of the B. C. Church, Summerside, left on Tuesday to take the pastoral charge of a congregation in Ontario.

RIOING occurred on the 11th at Tredgar, Wales, between Welsh and Irish. Many houses of Irishmen were sacked and several persons were severely injured.

THE Orange Tea at North Wiltshire, yesterday, was very largely attended. It passed off quietly, and the large number who went from town returned home well pleased with the day's amusement.

A LIST has been prepared by the Marine and Fisheries Department of the steamers in the various registry divisions of Canada, together with the maximum number of passengers they will be permitted to carry.

THE Canada "Gazette" contains an order in Council providing for an abatement of duty upon spirits, to be determined by the quantity of fuel oil formed during the distillation of the spirits on which the reduction is to be made.

THE number of deaths from heat in New York is reported very great. For twenty-four hours, ending at noon on the 11th inst., the number reported to the Bureau of vital statistics amounted to one hundred and seventy-nine; of these fifty eight were cases of infants under five years.

MR. WM. LEAMAM, of Moncton, on Friday morning last, while helping to remove a trunk from a freight train at Anagance, where an accident had occurred, slipped and fell, the trunk falling on him, striking him across the abdomen and injuring him so severely that he died from the effects on Saturday morning.

A CORRESPONDENT at Red Point writes as follows regarding the hail storm of Sunday last:—"It was one of the most terrible showers that ever passed over this district. The lumps of hail were from a quarter of an inch to an inch in diameter. They broke many windows, and damaged a large number of fruit trees."

THE shipments of sugar from the Moncton refinery since the first of July have been quite extensive, amounting up to yesterday (six days) to 1,998 barrels, or 463,807 pounds. The shipments were made to all parts of the Dominion, including Toronto, Halifax, St. John and other centres.—Moncton Times, July 8th.

She lived separate from the other wives, and kept her five children as much as possible from the rest.

TERMS REFUSED!

A Second Flag of Truce.

THE FLEET READY FOR MORE FIRING!

New York, July 12.

A despatch to the Herald says Toulba Pasha, the Egyptian military commander, has refused the terms demanded by Admiral Seymour to surrender the forts at the entrance to the harbor.

A second flag of truce was hoisted by the Egyptians. The result is not yet known. A large fire is visible in the direction of the British Consulate.

Yesterday the telephone attached Malta to Alexandria cable, and the bombardment was plainly audible at Malta.

The Suez Canal is reopened.

The British fleet have taken up positions in readiness to recommence the bombardment in the event of a failure of negotiations.

The Egyptian troops are supposed to have evacuated Alexandria.

Fires are issuing from a large proportion of the town.

A Deadly Explosion and a Heavy Failure.

LONDON, G. B., July 12.

A gas explosion in Rue Louis Philippe, Paris, last night, destroyed 12 houses, killed 20 and wounded 49 persons.

C. E. Miller the largest iron and steel merchant in Middlesboro have failed for £150,000 sterling.

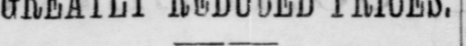
