MEN IN THE FIELD.

A WEEK ago THE EXAMINER expressed the hope that, ere Nomination Day, candidates to oppose those of the Farquharson Government would be found for every electoral district in the Province. This hope has been fully realized. Notwithstanding the shortness of the time, able and discreet men for business are today in the field, all over the Province, seeking the suffrages of those electors who are dissatisfied with the existing state of affairs. Even Mr. James Richards has not been permitted to walk the course. Everyone of the Government candidates is opposed by able and discreet men for business.

In the First District of Prince County, Messrs. Birch and Buote are in the field on behalf of clean, honest and economical government. Mr. Birch made a good record in the last legislature. He is an eloquent speaker and a capital representative of the bright intellect of this country. The ability of the talented business manager of L'Impartial has been demonstrated in the successful career of that journal. Of French extraction, Mr. Buote will ably represent the interests of the French Canadian people, as well as those of all other people in the First District and throughout the Province. The same remark will apply to Mr. J. F. Arsenault who is, with our well known friend, Mr. John A. Macdonald, one of the candidates for the Third District of Prince County, and to Mr. Gilbert DesRoches, one of the candidates for the Fifth District. That these prominent, enterprising and representative French-Canadians, are with Mr. Gallant of Rustico, candidates of the Opposition to the Farquharson Administration is significant of the fact that unanimity and good feeling exists between the English-speaking and French-speaking communities—that we are in point of fact, one people in opposition to bad government. James Barclay, Esquire, a prominent and well known citizen of O'Leary, is matched against Mr. McWilliams in the Second District of Prince, and Mr. Paulenus McDonald opposes Hon. James Richards. In the fourth district the Opposition candidates are Messrs Neil McQuarrie of Summerside, and John Anderson of Kensington—both men of proved ability, intimately interested in enterprises which make for the prosperity of their county and province. And as a colleague, for Mr. DesRoches in the fifth district we find our popular and worthy friend, Mr. James A. Mc-

Neill. These are all men of character and all well worthy of the confidence and support of their fellow electors in their respective districts.

In King's County there are in the field for the first district John McLean and John Kickham—both well known. McLean is a leading man of business in this Province. He has efficiently represented the Province in the House of Commons. His colleague is a man of excellent local reputation, an honest and popular man. For the second district of King's, the Opposition candidates are Mr. James McIsaac widely known as the editor of The Herald, and Mr. S. C. Clarke who in the two previous elections contributed more towards the election of the Messrs Peters than any other man. Now he is pitted against Mr. Arthur Peters in opposition to the party which has broken its promises to him as to all other electors in the Province, and disappointed his expectations. The Opposition in the third district of King's is represented by Messrs W. A. O. Morson one of the ablest lawyers in the Province, and Mr. James E. McDonald a prominent ship owner and exporter. In the fourth district Messrs Murdoch McKinnon who so ably represented the district in the last House, and Mr. John A. Mathieson, the popular and promising young barrister of Georgetown and Charlottetown are the Opposition candidates. Then for the fifth and last district of King's we have the veteran representatives—the Hon. A. J. Macdonald and the Hon. Daniel Gordon, Leader of the Opposition.
