A large crowd of hockey fans motored to O'Leary on March 24th to attend the game between O'Leary and Charlottetown.

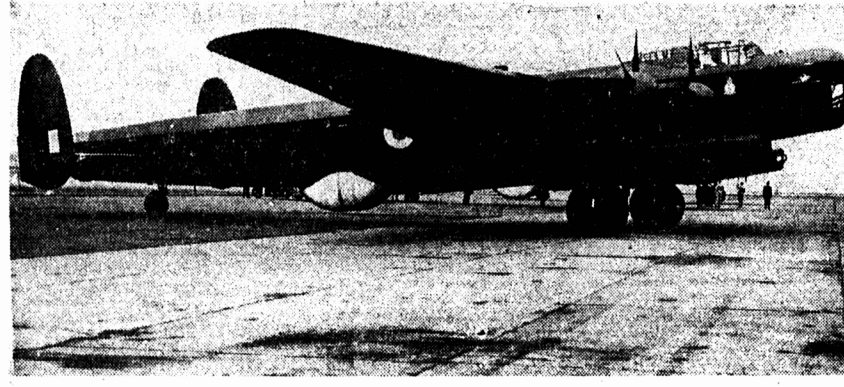

Gordon Pond Near Alberton Washed Out
The milldam at Gordon's Pond near Alberton washed out Saturday night in two places with the resultant loss of one of the best trout fishing locations in the district. Several days ago melting snow and rain raised the water level to the point of overflow but the dam withstood the flood and was considered safe. Saturday's continued rain again flooded the pond with water running over the dam in a steady torrent.

In recent years this pond was stocked with trout on several occasions by the Provincial Government. Members of the Prince County Fish and Game Association have been taking an interest in the pond and dam since the loss of the Gordon light plant by fire and it is expected that an attempt will be made by this organization to have the dam repaired.
