(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.) The Fitzpatrick Murder. ROBERTSON CAUGHT! The Winds Adverse To Him. GEORGETOWN, Oct. 31. Robertson, who, it is charged, shot the boy Fitzpatrick, has just been found by Mr. John Weatherly of this town. He was on board the schooner Borosa, of Nova Scotia, which had sailed for Canoe, and had to return on account of adverse winds. Robertson was handcuffed and handed over to Constable McKinnon of Charlottetown. Robertson will go by evening train to Charlottetown. Riel's Case. LONDON, Oct. 30. The Queen replied to the memorial of the Peace Society, praying for a commutation of the sentence of Riel, that she is unable to interfere in his case without first consulting her advisers. C. J. Stanley, Colonial Secretary, states that the Queen has fully delegated the pardoning power to the Marquis of Linton, and that it is impossible for the Home Government to interfere on Riel's behalf. Bulgaria and Servia. NESSA, Oct. 30. It is officially announced that Bulgarian forces have blockaded the frontier, and officers have issued orders to shoot any one found crossing from Servia to Bulgaria. The Servian troops have been ordered to reply in force in such an event. It is stated that bands of Bulgarians have commenced harassing the Servian frontier towns. "On to Cairo." LONDON, Oct. 30. The Times' correspondent at Assouan telegraphs that a number of nuns who escaped from rebel prisons have arrived at Assouan.
