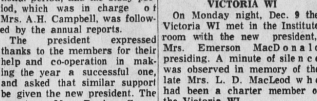

I was in the hospital last week and could not tell the doctor, but couldn't bring myself to tell him. I have a boy friend who likes me a lot. I think, but I don't want to tell him. I just want something to hold on to.

My grandfather and my sister treat me cruelly; they didn't even give me a birthday present, though they knew the day.

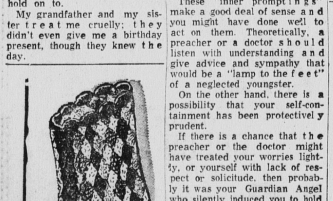
I write this not only to you but to all drinkers, to remind them of the people who suffer because of it. I hope my parents read it too, there any way you can help me? F.L.

Dear F.L.: You are in a tough spot, rather helpless, exposed to considerable suffering of mind and nerve that you can't pay or doctor should listen with understanding and find you a better choice for you than a neglected youngster.

Probably a woman confidante would be a "lamp to the feet" of a neglected youngster.

If there is a chance that the preacher or the doctor might have treated your worries lightly, or yourself with lack of respect or solicitude, then probably it was your Guardian Angel who silently induced you to hold your tongue. Had they let you down, it might have increased your discouragement.
