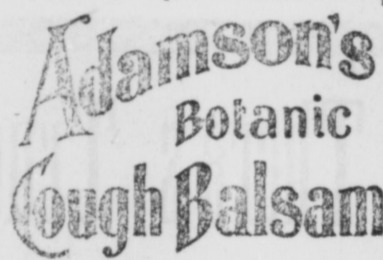

MOVEMENTS IN CHINA.

Russians Active--Boxers Attack Convent.

JAPANESE OFFICIAL BRUTALLY MURDERED.

Sixteen British Chase two Thousand Chinese—The Country Desolated.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

TIENTSIN, June 15.—A hundred and sixty-three British marines landed last evening. An additional twenty British have been sent to Fong Shan this morning.

A special train left Tientsin to bring General Nich to consult with the Viceroy. The telegraphic communication with Peking is still interrupted.

The want of transport prevents the Russians from landing troops. The Russians are very active here today. It is rumored that General Fuog Fah Siang with many thousands of troops is at Ping Tai.

The latest news from Peking is that "the boxers," 6000 strong, are attacking the Catholic Convent. This is critical. The officers are evidently inactive.

PEKING, June 13.—The Chancellor of the Japanese Legation, while proceeding alone and unprotected, on official duty, was brutally murdered by soldiers at Tung Fu Siang, the favorite body guard of the Emperor.

LONDON, June 13.—Sixteen marines reconnoitering in advance of the international column marching to Peking fought and chased 2000 Boxers on Monday, killing 20 or 30.

The evidence of Gen Nich's operations were found in headless bodies.

The whole country presents a desolate aspect, entire villages having been deserted.

The expedition numbers 2,044 as follows: British, 915; Germans, 250; Russians, 330; Frenchmen, 128; Americans, 164; Japanese, 82; Italians, 40 and Austrians, 25.

ROBERTS AND BOTHA MEET

British Gain Considerable Ground.

KITCHENER AND METHUEN DEFEAT DEWET.

Buller's Progress—Line of Communication Restored.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

A COMPLETE VICTORY.

LONDON, June 13.—Lord Roberts' line of communication has been practically restored by a complete victory gained by Lord Methuen and Lord Kitchener over General Dewet yesterday.

The Boers' camp was captured and the Burghers scattered in all directions.

BOTHA NOT DECISIVELY BEATEN.

LONDON, June 13.—Lord Roberts has fought a battle with General Botha, at the end of which, though the British gained considerable ground, the Boers were not beaten.

CROWN COLONIES.

LONDON, June 13.—The government has decided upon a plan for the civil settlement of South Africa. Details are kept most secret. But it can safely be said that the Orange River Colony and the Transvaal will become a Crown Colony.

The latter will probably be named the Transvaal Colony.

Sir Alfred Milner, it is declared, is to be High Commissioner to South Africa.

The Crown Colony form of government can be best understood by reference to a system in vogue in the West Indies, Sierra Leone and Ceylon.

Efforts will be made to put this in force as soon as possible in the Transvaal and Orange River colonies, though it is scarcely expected that details will be announced or some parts of the work begun before a few months have elapsed.

COMMUNICATIONS.

LONDON, June 13.—Telegraphic communication with Lord Roberts is expected to be restored today, as a despatch from Bloemfontein yesterday says that the railway is in British possession again and that the work of repairing the line is going on rapidly with abundant material warehoused at Bloemfontein.

ALONG THE LINE.

LONDON, June 13.—The War Office has also received the following from General Kelly-Kenny:

"BLOEMFONTEIN, June 12.—Our troops from the north are at Houtingspruit, south of Rooodeval, where the Boers cut the British lines of communication. Having defeated the enemy, they will be at America Siding tomorrow at 8 a. m.

CANADIAN RED CROSS.

OTTAWA, June 13.—Lord Roberts cables that he has forwarded a copy of a letter of Lord Methuen testifying to the excellent work done by the Canadian Red Cross Society at Kimberley.

BULLER'S PROGRESS.

LONDON, June 13.—The War Office has the following from General Buller: "Joubert's Farm, June 12.—Encamped four miles north of Volkstradt. Laing's Nek and Majuba were completely evacuated by the Boers last night.

General Clery from Ingogo is now coming over the Nek. I have had to camp here for want of water.

A correct list of yesterday's casualties will be sent as soon as received.

HUNTER'S VICTORY.

LONDON, June 13.—From the subjoined telegram it would appear that General Hunter was in command of the troops referred to by Kelly-Kenny in his despatch from Bloemfontein:

"BLOEMFONTEIN, June 12.—General Hunter is coming up rapidly from the northwest, having severely de-

feated a large command of Boers who had destroyed two miles of railway north of Kroonstadt."
