## Hearing Opens Today On C.A.R. Application

At the hearing before the Board of Transport Commissioners, which opens in the Legion Home, Alberton, today. Counsel for the transportation committee will be J. Melville Campbell, Summerside, and Melvin J. McQuaid, QC, Souris.

The board through its counsel is presenting objections to the Canadian National Railway's application to withdraw certain daily services from the Summerside-Tignish line.

Rev. David MacDonald, chairman of the transportation committee, said yesterday that he has heard the railway people are bringing 16 men with them to the hearing, and the transport commission has booked eight units at the Western Motel.

It is expected, Mr. MacDonald said, that the railway will present its case today, that the board of transport commissioners and its accountants will check the evidence and railway books submitted and the trade committees will probably have its opportunity to rebut the railway evidence and submit some of its own on Thursday.

Associated with Rev. MacDonald on the board of transport commissioners are Frank Bryan, Caspescap, A.W. Don Campbell, Alberton; Gerald Wells, Alberton; Andrew Handran, Tignish; Ed Turner, O'Leary, and Cyril Leard, Alberton, the board secretary.

Premier Walter Shaw, Resources Minister Leo Rossiter and several members of the department are also expected to sit in on the hearings, though there was no indication whether they will participate in the discussion.

## Conference Planned On Freight Rate Hike

A meeting to discuss the 26 per cent freight rate increase proposed by the Canada-United Kingdom Freight Conference will be held in St. John's, N.B., on Wednesday, Nov. 27.

The conference plans to increase its rates in January and government officials here fear that the increase will mean that this province will be in danger of losing its market for frozen french fried potatoes in the United Kingdom.

## Tyne Valley Seeks Approval Of Winter Works Project

TYNE VALLEY — A resolution to look into the possibility of clearing burnt wood along the central Prince County highway under the winter works program was passed by a special committee serving under the Tyne Valley Resource Development Association, at a special meeting here last night.

The resolution, passed by the committee on special problems, asked that labor costs up to \$8,000 for the project be applied for under this year's winter works program.

The committee's resolution will be studied within the next few days and the suggestion is considered feasible, the association will apply for the project as soon as possible.

More than 25 Tyne Valley area residents attended the meeting, called by the provincial department of resources and under the direction of fieldman Gordon Ripley.

Reid Sangster, provincial director of marketing, addressed the group, stressing how important it felt it was that everyone in the area lake part in the resource development program to the maximum.

"The greatest resource our country has," said Mr. Sangster, "is the resource of the people—the things they are able to achieve when determined."

He illustrated his point by telling the group of a three-year experience in Victoria County, Cape Breton, when the area was facing ruin because of the loss of its main industry, a gypsum plant at Digsway.

Cherry from the area had organized a resource development group he said and sent to St. Francis Xavier University, Antigonish, for Mr. Sangster to attend the program.
