IN MEMORIAM

WILLIAM DUNCAN MacLEOD

The sudden passing on August 21 of Mr. William Duncan MacLeod of Tignish came as a great shock to his family and to the community in which he was so well known. He was a kind neighbor and a true friend and in the lives of those who knew him best, he has left a gap which will be hard to fill.

Born in New London, 82 years ago he lived there until he was 11 after which he moved with his mother to Alberton where he lived till her death in 1915. Then he moved to Tignish where he lived till his passing.

He followed up the fishing industry in both his schooner and fishing boats all his life. He also was one of the men who helped start the Fishermen's Union in Tignish. The funeral was held in the United Church, Tignish, of which he was a member, on Aug. 5, when a large crowd assembled to pay their last respects to a good man.

The service was conducted by Rev. Murray Gardiner. The hymns sung were, "Jesus Saviour Pilot" and "Will Your Anchor Hold". "The Sweet Bye and Bye" was rendered by Mr. Russell Leard with members of the choir joining in the chorus.

Escaped Prisoner Returns To Jail

George Leonard MacDonald, 24, of Summerside who escaped from the Prince County Jail last Wednesday afternoon gave himself up voluntarily to assistant jailer H. L. Murphy about 11:15 Saturday evening but not without first trying to hide his identity. Mr. Murphy, who has been relieving as assistant jailer for the past few days, did not recognize MacDonald, who came to the jail seeking a night's lodging, and made it clear that he would like the doc to be unlocked so that he could leave in the morning without disturbing anyone.

MacDonald stated that he lived in Dartmouth, N.S., and was in Summerside seeking employment. Mr. Murphy became suspicious after a brief conversation with the escaped prisoner and had the man's identity confirmed by several inmates after which a placard was placed in a cell for safekeeping. MacDonald was serving a term for car theft and escaped about 5:15 p.m. last Wednesday, after being allowed out in the jail yard for a short period, previous to locking up for the night.

Woman Station Agent Retires

HALIFAX, N.S. - Claimed to be the first woman station agent performing all the duties of a full-fledged railway station agent on the entire Canadian National system, Miss Beattie Smith, late station agent for the C.N.R. at Hubbards, N.S., has retired.

Born at Pleasant River, N. S., Miss Smith joined the service of the Halifax and South Western Railway, now part of the Canadian National system, in August 1907 as a station agent at Brookfield Mines, N.S., having learned the details of the job from her brother who was a station agent. From then on she worked at various places as agent - Mahone Junction, Chester Basin, Wood Harbor, Barrington Passage, Lower Arsyfa, Pubnico, Medway, landing up at Hubbards as agent and operator where she remained up till the time of her retirement.

Among the highlights of her career was handling the first shipment of fish ever expressed from Hubbards to Boston. During her railway career she says she never had much time to travel but would like to go to Florida for a winter. Popular with railway officials, train and engine crews that passed her station, and patrons, Miss Smith will be greatly missed and a colorful figure has been removed from the active railway scene.

Native of India Interesting Speaker At Montrose United Church Last Night

Miss Winifred Goodwin, a native of India, was guest speaker at Montrose United Church last evening. Her brief address contained much interesting description of her homeland.

India, as a republic, is a young country, yet has a civilization which dates back to the prehistoric times of Babylon and Egypt. It is a land of contrasts where one finds extremes of climate during the one season, conditions of flood and drought, people of the south, north and east different in many ways. Within the 200 major languages and 200 dialects offer both problems and advantages. In this land of three hundred and sixty million people one finds poverty and wealth, learning and ignorance.

Among its many religions are Hinduism and Christianity, both as ancient as India itself, Christianity having been brought there by St. Thomas. The speaker described her country as a land of bubbling life with revolution going on in every phase of life. This is a time of hope for better things. The hope of the church is that there will be greater witnessing for Christ, particularly by the youth of India, and that all branches of the Christian Church within the country will soon be united in one body. Indians, she said, cannot understand why Christians should be divided. It is also the hope of the church in India that there will soon be greater brotherhood and peace in the heart of man.

Miss Goodwin graduated from Indraprastha College in 1933 and is a Christiana, a W.M.S. scholarship student at the University of Toronto. Dressed in her native sari, Miss Goodwin was introduced last evening by Rev. Alexander McDowell, minister of Montrose Church, who conducted the service.

While in Montrose she is the house guest of Miss Doreen Bow-ness.

Interesting Talk On Life In India At Sea View

An informal talk on various aspects of life in India was given by the Rev. Harry F. Newman at Sea View Hall, before a keenly interested audience on August 25. The speaker recalled leaving Kensington on short notice in 1944, on receiving a hoped-for appointment as a missionary to India; the long wait for passage and finally the trip which consumed four and a half months from New York to India, with slow moving ships and long stop-overs in ports, due to wartime restrictions.

On arrival in the East, habits commonplace in India, appeared shocking at first sight to the Canadians, as the close resemblance to blood, of the red juice of the betel nut, chewed by the natives; and the sidewalks in early morning occupied by sleeping figures, outside to escape the heat which commonly rises to 100 degrees and more.

Mr. Newman described the average Indian as "oppressed and downtrodden" and to inadequate nourishment and the constant heat. Homes are composed of clay with thatched roof and mud floor. The main crops grown are rice and wheat. Referring to the women, he said: "All are graceful, even the poorest, when wrapped in their saris," which are very colorful.

Prior to the partition of India and Pakistan, the hostilities between Mohammedans and Hindus was intense and difficult to explain. The speaker had nothing but praise for Prime Minister Nehru, whom he described as very cultured, and he believed he would do much toward leading the people to lay aside the many superstitious beliefs concerning sacred cows and monkeys and holy cities. Much of the backwardness of the people is explained by the lack of any desire for education, which is not compulsory. Children are sent out to work for the few pennies they can earn at unskilled labour, and miss the education needed to increase their earning power.

Speaking of Mr. and Mrs. Samuels who were recent visitors here, he said they were exceptional and the average Indian must not be judged by them, who, like Mr. Nehru, were educated and cultured.

Mr. Newman said his work in India was mostly related to agriculture, in an attempt to help the farmer to grow better crops and more vegetables for health. He felt that if they were helped in material things they were in a more receptive mood to accept the higher things of life.

After some four years in India, Mr. Newman and his wife and growing family, returned to Canada, and now live near Toronto. A vote of thanks was moved by Mr. Casey Adams and seconded by Mr. James R. Murphy on behalf of the gathering for a very interesting address.

Chase Challenges Yvon Durelle

SAINT JOHN, N. B. (CP) - A challenge for Canadian middleweight champion Charlie Chase of Montreal to Yvon Durelle, Baie Ste. Anne, N.B., for the latter's Canadian light heavyweight title has been filed with the Canadian Boxing and Wrestling Federation, the federation president, G. K. Garnett, announced Sunday night.

Mr. Garnett said the challenge will be forwarded to Durelle, who won his crown two months ago, and the federation will not act until Durelle "makes his wishes known on the matter."

Chase took the middleweight championship in a bout against Harry (Kid) Poulton of Charlottetown in June. The challenge was issued by Chase's co-managers, Sylvio Mireault and Russ Leighton.

Durelle regained the title from Doug Harper two months ago in a match at Newcastle, N.B. Mr. Garnett said if the Chase-Durelle fight is held and Chase wins, the Montreal fighter would have to relinquish his middleweight crown.
