DETROIT (AP) — Gordie Howe, one of the hottest scoring streaks of his National Hockey League career, fired three goals Sunday as Detroit Red Wings defeated New York Rangers 4-2.

Howe tied the score 1:1 in the first period and Detroit ahead early in the next session. He got both goals on dazzling plays. The 34-year-old veteran, playing his 17th NHL season, has scored seven times in his last four games.

Val Fonteyne scored what proved to be the winning goal midway in the second period, Detroit leading 3-1.

Dean Prentiss made it close to Red Wings' goal in close to the third period. But Norm Ulanen scored the first goal in the final two minutes.

Howe's tie-breaking goal, an unassisted one, gave the Red Wings a 4-2 lead over the Rangers.

Bruce Kidd Bill Crothers Snatter Meet Records

BOSTON (CP) — Bruce Kidd and Bill Crothers set meet records to show the way for a strong Canadian contingent competing in the Knights of Columbus indoor track meet here Saturday night.

Kidd, 19, smashed the two-mile record he set here in 1961, and Crothers set a meet mark in the 1,000-yard run, hustling home in two minutes, 4.6 seconds. Both are University of Toronto students, running for East York Track Club.

A feud between two U.S. sports bodies, the Amateur Athletic Union and the National Collegiate Athletic Association about sanctioning rights for track and field meets hurt the meet here. Several club events were put on to fill out the program, and there were only two heats in the 50-yard dash, won by pit-sized Iru Murchison of Chicago in 5.5 seconds.

Still there was a slight crack in a boycott ordered by the U.S. Track and Field Federation, the NCA's backfield group which is doing despite the sanctioning power with the AAU. Boston K of C officials did not ask federation sanction, but three University of Maryland athletes complied as unsanctioned athletes despite the boycott.

The meet was the first of the indoor season sponsored by the National Indoor Track Meet Directors Association, which voted Saturday to continue its regular winter schedule under sanction only of the AAU.

The association said it would continue to welcome the entries of colleges and universities, barred from such meets unless sanction is obtained from the NCA-backed Track and Field Federation.

Major's Announce Signing of Players

NEW YORK (CP)—With the U.S. football season taking its last profitable gasps, the major league baseball owners announced a signing of players.

Chicago White Sox and San Francisco Giants grabbed their first contracts, the White Sox with two rookies, catcher J. C.
