Here, a comical situation develops when the unmarried girl is required to explain the presence of the "baby", and Gwenn threatens to blacklist the agency unless Scott, whom he suspects of being the father, promises to marry Betsy. What follows provides much of the comedy, highlighted by Morgan's rendition of the title song while standing atop an unsteady ladder.

In producing "Pretty Baby" Harry Kurnitz selected a cast of veteran Hollywood laugh-makers including Gwenn, who won an Academy Award for his role as Santa Claus in "The Miracle of 34th Street", Ransom Sherman and Raymond Roe, folks for Milton Berle's rags in "Always Leave Them Laughing", and William Frawley, master of the double-take.
