THERE IS GOING TO BE A FIGHT Unless President Kruger Surrenders

EVERYTHING NOW READY FOR AN ADVANCE.

Engineers for South Africa Sensational Rumors in London.

LONDON, June 13.—A detachment of 200 Royal Engineers sailed yesterday for South Africa from Southampton.

LONDON, June 13.—Active military preparations looking to trouble in the Transvaal continue.

All the papers speak of the situation as grave and speculation is indulged in as to whether Kruger will surrender, and grant the reform demanded in the ultimatum now en-route.

The government is in a mood to brook no trifling and every preparation for a quick advance on Johannesburg is being made.

It is now reported that Lord Kitchener will command in the event of hostilities, his superior generalship being relied upon to bring a Boer campaign to a speedy and successful issue.

LONDON, June 13.—The Daily Graphic which is not given to making sensational statements, and which is almost invariably trustworthy, says there is good reason to believe that the Government regards the situation created by the breakdown of the Blomfontein negotiations as exceedingly serious.

The conclusion has forced itself on Her Majesty's ministers that if the Transvaal persists in its present attitude, Great Britain can have no alternative but to seek a solution of the difficulty by force.

The Pope's Protest.

ROME, June 10.—The Pope descended into the Vatican gardens today for the first time since his illness. Mgr. Tarnassi, Papal interuncio at The Hague, who is now in Rome, having left The Hague presumably as a protest against the exclusion of the Pope from the Peace Conference, will probably be transferred to Munich and be succeeded at The Hague by Mgr. Guidi.

Changes and Promotions on the Staff.

MONTREAL, June 13.—At the monthly meeting of the Board directors of the C P Railway Co. Vanhorne was elected chairman of the Board and Thos G. Shaughnessy was elected president.

No successor was appointed to Shaughnessy as Vice President, but it is probable that R. B. Angus will be named.

It is said that Robert Keir, of Winnipeg, will succeed MacNicol, and C. E. McPherson, of Toronto, district passenger agent, will succeed Keir as passenger traffic manager west of Fort William.

After the meeting, Shaughnessy announced the promotion of D. McNicol, General Manager of Passenger traffic to the office of Assistant General Manager.

French Ministry Resigned

PARIS, June 13.—The Dupuy Ministry resigned. The chamber adopted by a vote of 321 to 173 an order of the day proposed by M. Ruan, Radical, which the premier refused to accept. The Minister forthwith left the house amid excitement.

Dreyfus' Mind Unhinged.

LONDON, June 10.—A despatch from Cayenne, French Guiana, to a local news agency, states that the second class French cruiser Stax has left the Isle du Salut with Captain Dreyfus on board. Captain Dreyfus said in an interview:—"I knew that General de Boisdeffre would obtain preparation for me for the attack upon my honor. I knew also that the perseverance and firmness of my friends would succeed in obtaining the revision, that is finally granted, of my trial."

Captain Dreyfus is ignorant of the part that Col. Piquard has played in his defence. He knows nothing of the work that Emile Zola has done. His conversation is vague, and rambles among various subjects without connection. He knows that Esterhazy was the author of the bordereau. He asked:—"Who is the officer that is to bring me back to France?" He was told that Captain Caciux, of the gendarmerie, would take him to the Commandant of the cruiser Stax, on which he would sail for France. He asked:—"Of what class is the Stax, and what is the name of its commandant?"

Fought Their Way Through.

MANILA, June 10.—Twenty-five American soldiers, who were engaged in reconnoitering in the fortified hills in the vicinity of Morong, yesterday, were attacked by three hundred Filipinos. The Americans fought their way home through the enemy and inflicted severe losses on them. The chief scout accompanying the Americans was killed. Five Filipinos were captured and taken to Morong. The enemy is very active. The Garrison Cavalry and the North Dakota Infantry are employed in throwing up intrenchments.

MR. FIELDING BRINGS DOWN

Last Batch of Supplementary Estimates

CALLING FOR A VOTE OF 2,647,628 Dollars.

The Dismissal of W. D. McMillan of Wood Island.

OTTAWA, June 13.—Mr Fielding brought down what is supposed to be his last batch of supplementary estimates for the fiscal year ending the last of this month.

It calls for a vote of \$2,647,628 of which \$1,993,575 is chargeable to current account and \$453,919 to capital. For civil government an additional \$21,000 is required and for legislation \$23,000.

There is a further amount for militia defence of \$274,000 besides \$10,000 for accoutrements chargeable to capital.

The capital account of the Intercolonial is swelled by \$35,460 including \$20,000 for rolling stock, \$4,350 for rest houses at engine stations, \$5,000 for machinery and \$2000 for a turntable at Moncton.

There is a vote of \$5,300 in aid of Central Railway of New Brunswick, acknowledged to be done on contract. For a Halifax quarantine station \$17,000; for purchase of a steamer for St. Lawrence service, \$21,500; to pay Peters and Bodwell, counsel in the Behring Sea award \$1000 each additional to previous payments; to complete North West Mounted Police service there is no less than \$385,000, besides \$50,000 elsewhere.

The Minister of Militia asks for another quarter of a million to finish his militia appropriations in the Yukon.

The Yukon is responsible for another \$25,000.

In the Public Works Dept., Mr. Sifton finds it necessary to ask for another \$300,000 for Yukon expenditure.

In the Interior Department Mr. Mulock wants \$103,900 additional to pay expenses for the Yukon post office service. The total Yukon vote in the supplementary estimates is \$1,130,056.

International Commission at Washington is down for \$14,600.

For the purchase of a wharf at Mount Stewart, in connection with P. E. Island Railway \$3,500

Mr. Alex. Martin, of P. E. Island moved for all the papers respecting the dismissal of Wm. D. McMillan from the position of light house keeper at Wood Islands, P. E. I. He said that McMillan was discharged for alleged offensive partisanship and claimed that McMillan had not been guilty of this offence, but had been dismissed because he refused to help the Liberal candidate in a local election and in order that his position might be secured for Liberal party heeler.

The Minister of Marine said a commissioner had investigated McMillan's conduct and found him guilty of offensive partisanship.

The allegation that the dismissal was the result of a Provincial election matter was news to him.

He promised to bring down the papers asked for.

THE POLICE FORCE.

SIR.—At last night's meeting of the City Council, the magistrate stated that there is now on the police force men who are not fit for the position. He was not contradicted by any of the councillors, and indeed it would be hard for them to conscientiously do so; for we all know there are one or two at least on the force who are in no respect fit for the job. I would ask why are those men kept on? Is it not time the force was renovated? There are plenty of men anxious for the job who would comply with Councilor Horne's resolution, and let those who have the power to dismiss and appoint act, and act immediately. Citizens desire this, and I trust action will be taken at once. Goodness knows a change in this department is exceedingly necessary.

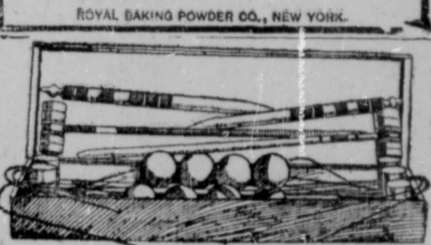
