

Prince Arthur of England.

Prince Arthur of England, according to the London Truth, is fond of his profession of soldier, and has given it as much attention as could be fairly demanded from a person who has also to follow the profession of royalty. An eternal and obligatory round of dinners, concerts, balls, laying of foundation stones, opening of docks, presiding at meetings of benevolent societies, and other such social duties, most of them accompanied by the necessity of making a speech [to say nothing of previously thinking it out], these things are almost enough of themselves to employ the better part of a man's energies. He has begged hard to be sent on active service, and has invariably been refused. In the event of a European war he would probably be given a command, but we have had none since he attained to years of discretion, and no Ministry has cared to incur the responsibility of sending him to fight savages. Had he been assaiged by Zulus instead of Prince Louis Napoleon, the clamor would probably have been of the noisiest. He first volunteered for the Abyssinian campaign before he had completed his eighteenth year. A few years later he moved heaven and earth to be allowed to accompany his regiment on the Ashantee expedition, but both his august mother and Mr. Gladstone were inflexible. All he could do was to accompany his comrades in arms to the place of embarkation, and sorrowfully shake hands with them all round. 'I wish to the deuce I could go with you fellows,' he ruefully exclaimed; and every one knew how sincere was the longing expressed. Lord Beaconsfield was as resolute as his predecessor in refusing to permit the Prince to go to Afghanistan or the Cape, though considerable pressure was put on the first Minister. It was a practice of Prince Arthur's in his boyhood—and may be in his manhood—to write regularly every day to the Queen when away from her.

Selwyn, the Director General of the Geological Survey, has just returned from a three months' visit to the North-West. He has been giving special attention to the coal fields of the region. His observations have been principally in the Souris district, about 250 miles west of Winnipeg, and near the boundary of the United States. He gives a glowing description of the fertility and adaptability for settlement of this country, and believes the coal supply will be sufficient to prevent any difficulty as to fuel in the district.

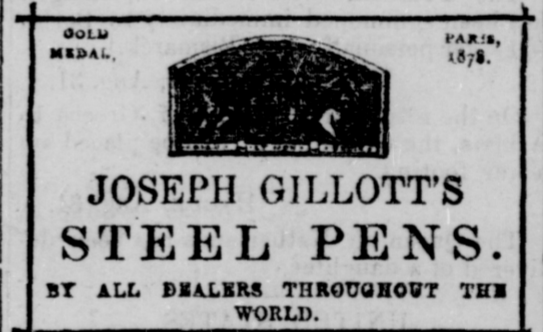
