MONDAY

In solemn tribute to his late Majesty King George VI church...

The sorrow of a nation was reflected in the deeply respectful attitude of congregations throughout the city as they listened to the simple words of praise for a monarch who had earned a place in the affections of all mankind...

Yesterday in many of the Summerside churches the services were in the nature of a tribute to the late King George VI.

Prayers were recited, special hymns sung and sermons in the most churches paid tribute to the King and invocations for the guidance of the new Queen Elizabeth II.

A fire in the home of Mrs. Keith Cameron, 71 Water St. East, in Summerside, was discovered by her daughter, Mrs. Margaret Rankin, about 5 a.m. on Saturday morning.

Mrs. Rankin awakened early and smelled smoke. Upon investigation she found the living room to be on fire, and because of smoke was unable to reach the telephone located in the room, to summon help.

She immediately rushed next door and phoned the Summerside Fire Department, who quickly responded to the call.

The hardwood floor in one corner of the room was badly burned as was a chesterfield chair, scatter rugs, window drapes, window casing, and baseboard under the window.

The fire was confined within the living room, and fortunately was discovered before more damage was done to the home.

TUESDAY

SURVEY UNDER WAY - It is reported that representatives of the Federal Department of Public Works Boring Branch, Ottawa, are here boring and sampling to determine the best site for the proposed causeway across the Hillsborough River. It was announced previously that boring for suitable rock for fill for the causeway had produced satisfactory results.

Members of the City Council paid tribute to his late Majesty King George VI at their monthly meeting held last evening, at which His Worship Mayor Stewart gave a brief memorial address.

Miss Anna Malr, for 25 years Superintendent of the P. E. I. Hospital, was honored last night on the occasion of her pending retirement from her post.

On a roll call graduates of the Hospital from as long ago as 1912 answered as each class year was called in turn.

The Summerside Town Council, Mayor Henry W. Wedge presiding, met last night for the first meeting of the year, following the civic election. All councillors were present.

Mayor Wedge congratulated Councillors Morrison and Steele on their reelection and welcomed the newly elected councillor, William E. Jenkins representing the East Ward.

He paid a special tribute to former councillor J. Lloyd Gorrill who, he said, had given 12 years of faithful service to the town of Summerside.

Fire, discovered at noon yesterday, completely destroyed Leard's mill, a well known landmark at Crapaud.

Lost in the fire was all the mill equipment and machinery and a quantity of dried lumber which was stored in the mill.

The fire is believed to have started in the woodworking section of the mill, and was first observed from her home, shortly after noon by Mrs. Amy Howatt, Crapaud telephone operator, who immediately phoned Mr. Leard at his home, and also called the fire departments from Crapaud and nearby Victoria.

Mr. Leard, who lives near the mill, was first to arrive at the scene of the fire, and although everything had been in good order when he left the mill a short time before, the whole mill was

hopelessly ablaze with the fire making rapid headway in the timber and wooden building.

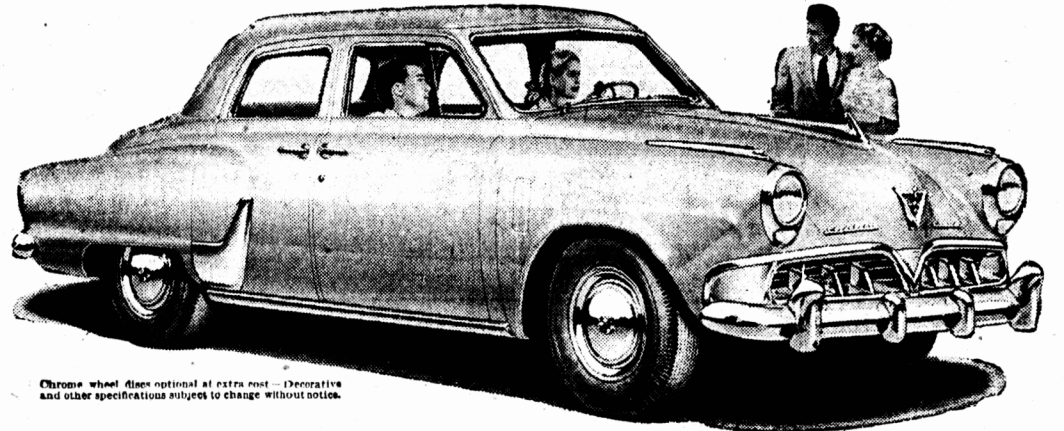

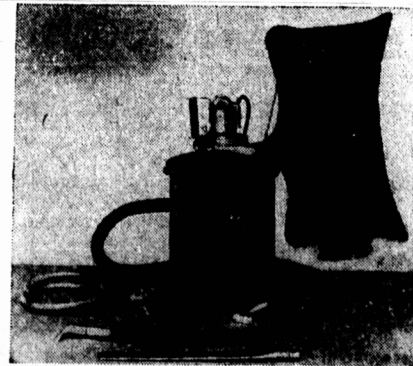
