## MEETING AT KENSINGTON.

Interesting Addresses by Mr. Hodson and Others.

Mr. Hodson, Live Stock Commissioner held his first meeting at Kensington on Monday night. Mr. William McNeil Simpson, was chairman. The first speaker was Premier Farquharson, who introduced Mr. Hodson and his colleagues and explained the nature of the meeting.

Mr. Elderkin, president of the Maritime Stock Breeders Association, gave a resume of the history of the organization and announced that the annual meeting would be held next November in Charlottetown. He explained the efforts made to get free transportation to exhibition, and stated that this fall all exhibits are to be carried free to several exhibitions of the Maritime Provinces over the Government railways. He dwelt on the necessity of the Maritime Provinces making the most of their opportunities and striving to get better transport facilities to carry their produce cheaply to the markets and not be handicapped as at present.

Mr. Robertson, of the Napan Experimental Farm, gave a short address on the necessity of cooperation and pushing the interests of the farmers.

Mr. Hubbard, Secretary of the Maritime Provinces Live Stock Association addressed the meeting briefly on the necessity of keeping better stock.

Mr. Hodson mentioned the advantages of the Lower Provinces in regard to good pasturage throughout the season and the abundance of our root crops—far exceeding that of Ontario. He dwelt principally on the necessity of organization, and outlined the plan he would advise us to follow. Mr. Hodson explained the conditions that obtained in Ontario, following the drop in the price of wheat, peas and barley which compelled the people to go into other business such as dairying and live stock. He gave a detailed account of the progress made by breeding up the stock and showed how prices advanced with the improvement in the quality of the stock. Again he explained the advantage of cheap freight rates, how organization could effect improvement in these lines and how the Ontario Association managed the winter live stock show. The judges of beef cattle told the competing farmers why they gave the prizes in all cases, and then had the animals butchered and the beef qualities of each shown to the producers,—why one animal was worth more than others apparently as good, and how they could breed in lines to obtain the best results.

Ontario is divided into one hundred agricultural districts and farmers' institutes. P. E. Island could be divided into ten such organizations and meetings held in the different sections having an interchange of speakers from different parts of the province and from other provinces as well. We could thus have an educational system established where all the farmers could learn and assist in an organized way to overcome disadvantages that may stand in the way of better returns.

Messrs. Simpson, H. A. Stewart and D. Rogers each spoke briefly after Mr. Hodson, Mr. W. Simpson, moved a vote of thanks seconded by Dr. Darrach.

Mr. Hodson stated at the closing that a plan of organization will shortly be outlined for the Maritime Provinces, and submitted for the approval of the people at an early date.

Owing to its being a very busy hay-making day, and also because of insufficient notice the meeting was not largely attended.

**STEWART, PRINCE CHARLIE.**—“This Tartan is copied from a riding cloak worn by Prince Charlie, and left with other articles in the castle of one of his followers whose descendant now owns it—Sir James Murray Threipland of Fingask. The cloak has a velvet collar, and is bound with a red silk ribbon, which has faded at the sleeves into a light purple, but it is difficult to say what was the original color of the collar, while the colors of the Tartan are as fresh as if made yesterday. The colors and design are the same as in the Tartan imported by Messrs. Paton & Co, and worn by the Kirk boys, with the exception that the blue, which is light, has been placed in the centre instead of on the outside of the check. The boys will wear the Stewart Prince Charlie red ground dark blue green and black check; yellow, white and black lines. —2d 2w

**BADLY DAMAGED.**—The Turret Bell, which was ashore at Byron Island, has been drenched at Halifax and pumped dry. An examination of the hull revealed the fact that the damage is very serious. The plates are broken all along the starboard side and beneath the boilers the ship is considerably torn. A survey will be held and tenders for the ship's repair will be called for. The contract will be an extensive one.

## NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—A strong pro-Boer feeling—born of ignorance—is said to have developed in Montenegro.

—The decrease in the value of goods received at British ports in South Africa during the year ending June 30, for the trade with the Transvaal and Orange Free State, was nearly £2,750,000 sterling, as compared with the figures of the same period in 1899. The decrease in receipts for Rhodesia was nearly £100,000.

—The Duke of Albany, son of the late Prince Leopold, will succeed to the Dukedom of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha, the Duke of Connaught and his son having renounced the succession. The press dispatches state that during the minority of the Duke of Albany the government of the Duchy will be administered by his brother-in-law and guardian, the Hereditary Prince of Hohenlohe-Langenburg.

—According to information obtained in London, some friction has arisen between the Vatican and the Washington Government respecting the rights, privileges and property of the church in the Philippines. There is a suspicion in Cardinal Rampolla's mind that negotiations are proceeding secretly between the American authorities in Manila and the insurgent chiefs, in the course of which a demand of the latter that the present Spanish clergy should be expelled from the Philippines and their property confiscated has not been rejected with indignation.

—In a letter to the New York Expansionist Mr. Francis Wayland Glen tells the story of the institution of the National Continental Union League, whose object is the adding of Canada's territory to the United States. Among other things mentioned is that the declaration of principles was modified to suit the ideas of the late Mr. Mercer, the Quebec Liberal chief. In his last and disastrous electoral struggle, Mr. Mercer had a great deal of United States sympathy, and Mr. Glen's letter probably gives the clue to the reason. The Montreal Gazette remarks that it would be interesting to know how far Mr. Mercer was prepared to go in aiding the Wiman Glen movement, and who were prepared to work with him.

## THE DUKE OF MARLBOROUGH

TELLS OF HIS EXPERIENCE IN SOUTH AFRICAN FIGHTS.—HE PRAISES THE CANADIANS.

The Duke of Marlborough had a most interesting experience in South Africa, and, though participating in many fights and undergoing long marches, came through without a scratch or a day's illness.

After leaving Bloemfontein, where he was attached to Lord Roberts' staff, the Duke joined Ian Hamilton, acting as “galloper” for him during the hard-fought progress toward Pretoria. The Duke had several narrow escapes. On one occasion a shell burst within a few feet of him. A fragment hit General Hamilton in the small of the back and knocked him down, but by great luck it failed to penetrate. The Duke escaped all the flying fragments.

Entering Pretoria ahead of the army, the Duke, accompanied only by his cousin, Winston Churchill, rode out to the enclosure where the British officers were imprisoned. These at first took him for a Boer, but when he was recognized the prisoners sat up a howl of delight.

A Boer sentry raised his gun and was about to fire point blank, but the commandant stopped him and surrendered to the Duke, who promptly put the Boers within the enclosure.

The British officers, pale, and with beards of six months' growth, cried, laughed and cheered like madmen. Then they hoisted a Union Jack made of stolen virkleu, and which was put together during their captivity.

The Duke has returned home because General Hamilton's staff has been broken up. He says he is proud of his Yeomanry, though he was with them but a short time. He was immensely struck with the Canadians, and perfectly satisfied that the British soldier, especially the infantrymen, is as good as any in the world. He believes the Boers' resistance will continue at any rate until November, as they are firmly convinced that if the Democrats are successful in the Presidential election the United States will intervene in their behalf.

Considering his ancestry, it is scarcely surprising that the Duke took a keen, practical interest in his work, and lived just like any officer, being often on the shortest of “short commons.” But he looks better, instead of worse, for his trip.

## OTHER ASSASSINATIONS.

OTHER ATTEMPTS, MANY SUCCESSFUL, ON LIVES OF RULERS.

From 1848 to 1898 there were twenty eight attempts, many of them successful, on the lives of royal personages and rulers.

Pietro Acciarito tried to kill King Humbert on April 22, 1897.

Four attempts were made to assassinate the great Napoleon.

Queen Victoria's life has been attempted three times.

Two efforts were made to kill the Prince of Wales.

Napoleon III. was frequently shot at but died in bed.

The King of Prussia was twice fired at in 1851, but escaped injury.

King Victor Emmanuel of Italy narrowly escaped death at an assassin's hands in 1856.

The Queen of Greece was shot by a student in 1862.

Abraham Lincoln, President of the United States, died on April 15, 1865, from a bullet fired by Wilkes Booth the night before.

One attempt on the life of the German Emperor in 1873 and another in 1878.

King Alfonso of Spain was shot at in 1878.

Alexander II. of Russia was assassinated on March 13, 1881, in St. Petersburg. Unsuccessful attempts on his life had been made in St. Petersburg in 1866 and in Paris in 1867.

President James A. Garfield was shot by Charles J. Guiteau on July 2, 1881, and died on September 19.

President Carnot of France was stabbed to death by Caserio Santo in Paris, June 24, 1894.

A bomb was thrown at President Faure, of France, on June 13, 1897.
