

Tie With U.S. Power Grid Said Federal Gov't Policy

OTTAWA (CP) — Electrical power exports and a national power grid tied in with the United States were listed here by Trade Minister Sharp as features of national policy.

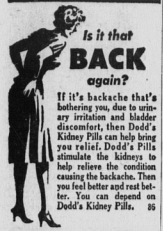
The former Conservative government and Opposition Leader Diefenbaker immediately said no.

The government wants to encourage power - transmission and agreements across the country between private and public utilities to form a grid. Mr. Sharp said, although "it realizes that the complete interconnection may not be economically feasible for some years to come."

To this end, studies were continuing.

Further, it would be "beneficial to Canada and to the U.S., and not prejudicial to the national interest, to encourage inter-connection agreements and inter-connection agreements in cases where the latter is a condition of the agreement suitably protect the Canadian interest."

The government would consider favorably, on a recommendation of the National Energy Board, the export of large amounts of constantly-supplied or "firm" power to encourage the development of power resources that might otherwise remain undeveloped, Mr. Sharp

U.S. Court Ruling Delays Newfoundland Pulp Mill

ST. JOHN'S Nfld. (CP) — A \$3,000,000 court judgment against the Curtis Publishing Company is holding up the establishment of a third pulp mill in Newfoundland.

Premier Smallwood indicated this in the Newfoundland legislature, although he didn't name the "large publishing company" involved.

It's been a dream of Mr. Smallwood's for years to establish a third mill on the east coast of the province to go with the two existing paper mills in central and western Newfoundland.

An agreement between Newfoundland Pulp and Chemical Limited, which plans the mill and the "large publisher" to take the sulphite pulp that would be produced was rejected by the court.

The signatories had been

ready to be put on the contracts the day before the United States Supreme Court handed down a "judgment against the company for \$3,000,000," Mr. Smallwood said, and the agreement was not signed.

STILL INTERESTED?
 Mr. Smallwood said the publishing company "will recede from it" and is still interested in the pulp deal. "They are appealing" the decision against the company.

The suit emerged from a story published in the Saturday Evening Post alleging that two U.S. football coaches were involved in attempting to fix a game in which both were coaching.

The third mill was to have been built at Come-By-Chance, on the isthmus that connects the Avalon Peninsula with the rest of Newfoundland. It was expected to turn out 300 tons of pulp a day.

Mr. Smallwood, who had been answering a request for a progress report on the mill put by William J. Browne (PC-St. John's East Extern), said: "I've been disappointed on it so often . . . I don't know . . . I don't give any guarantee."

SUBMITS RESIGNATION
BOON (AP) — West German Chancellor Adenauer submitted his official letter of resignation Friday to President Heinrich Lübke. Wednesday the Bundestag (parliament) is scheduled to choose Economics Minister Ludwig Erhard, 66, as chancellor. Adenauer, 87, has been West Germany's first and only chancellor for 14 years.

Cigarette Case Court Review Denied Widow
WASHINGTON ZAP — A New Orleans widow has been denied a United States Supreme Court review of a suit, unsuccessful in lower courts, in which she contended two tobacco companies were liable for the death of her husband, a cigarette smoker who died of lung cancer.

Victoria St. Pierre Lartigue sued in district court in New Orleans after the death in 1955 of Frank Lartigue. Her suit named the R.J. Reynolds Tobacco Company and Liggett and Myers Tobacco Company. A jury decided against her and the U.S. circuit court in New Orleans affirmed the result. The Supreme Court announced its decision Monday.

Mrs. Lartigue contended cigarette manufacturers were guilty of breach of an implied warranty of wholesomeness in selling their products; that this warranty is absolute, regardless of whether the manufacturer knew, or should, or could have known of defects in products.

The defendant told the Supreme Court Lartigue died at 65 after she smoked nine packs a day for 15 years. The brief said Mrs. Lartigue had not cited any case in Louisiana which held a manufacturer was an insurer against unknown risks.

Toronto Man Crosses Swords With Chaput
TORONTO (CP) — A Toronto professor has accused separatist leader Marcel Chaput of spitting at those who offer Quebec equal rights in Canada under Confederation.

James Eays, professor of political science at the University of Toronto, crossed verbal swords Sunday night with Mr. Chaput, leader of Quebec's Republican party, during a televised debate on the CTV network.

Mr. Chaput said French-speaking Canada is a nation and must have full political autonomy.

Mr. Eays interjected: "You treat any new approaches to the problem as no more than crumbs from the English-speaking table. We offer no crumbs but half the loaf. Why do you spit in our eyes for that?"

Disappointment Expressed With Activities of EEC

QUEBEC (CP) — Canadian businessmen were told here there is a clear danger the European Economic Community may turn into a discriminatory and narrow-minded regional bloc instead of being a leader toward freer trade as has been hoped.

The Canadian Chamber of Commerce, at its annual meeting, was told by a Canadian and a British industrialist

that recent EEC actions have caused sharp disappointments. Carl A. Pollock of Kitchener, president of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, said EEC internal tariff barriers "are certainly coming down thick and fast, but external tariffs are rising just as fast."

Sir Nutcombe Hume, chairman of the Charterhouse Investment Trust Limited in England, told the same panel on international trade that the idealism once associated with the EEC is tarnished "and there is scepticism about the road which the Six will follow."

SPARK SIMILAR MOVES
 Mr. Pollock said the possibility of the EEC raising trade barriers against the rest of the world "is greatly to be feared, for it would in the long run unquestionably spark the creation of similar blocs equally intent on raising barriers against nearly everyone else outside . . ."

Sir Nutcombe asked the delegates to think about whether the West could afford to spy indefinitely artificial restrictions on trade with the Eastern bloc on ideological grounds.

Canadian Bread Is Seen Threat In N.Y. State
UTICA, N.Y. (AP) — A bakery union leader said Monday that the jobs of thousands of northern New York state bakers are being threatened by importation of tariff-free Canadian bread into the United States.

Daniel J. Motto, president of the New York-New Jersey district of the Bakery and Confectionery Workers of America, commented before entering what he said was an "emergency meeting" of his union's executive committee to deal with the situation.

Motto said Canadian bread was under-selling U.S. bread in northern New York, especially in the Buffalo-Rochester area but also as far east and south as Syracuse.

American bakers are unable to take counter measures, he said, because they must pay a 7½-per-cent tariff on bread they send into Canada, while their competitors' bread is admitted to the U.S. without a tariff charge.

Motto said four bakeries had gone under in Buffalo and one in Rochester as a result of competition from Canadian bread.
