REFINED SUGAR.—There were seven cars of sugar from the Nova Scotia Sugar Refinery, Halifax, at the Station this morning, bound North—one to Montreal, three to Hamilton and three to Toronto. The Moncton Refinery shipped 300 barrels yesterday.—*Transcript.*

The renovation of Government House before its transference to Lieut-Governor Macdonald, has been completed, and the key handed over to him this week. He has just moved in, the official flag having been hoisted there yesterday for the first time since his appointment on the 1st of August last.

A SACKVILLE (N. B.) despatch says: The first engine passed over a portion of the P. E. I. and N. B. railway on Monday last, and the cattle quietly feeding on the marshes, suddenly stampeded over ridge, ditch and dale, this way and that, not knowing where to turn as the iron horse, puffing and snorting, approached them.

SERGEANT ALLAN, Keeper of the Government Poor House, informs us that he has now in charge three promising children—two boys and a girl—one six months old, and the others sixteen months old. He would be glad to give them in charge of any persons who would adopt them. He has permission from the mothers to do so. [se 13 31]

A private letter received at Ottawa, dated August 17th, from St. Vincent, British West India, states that a "Coole" ship reached St. Lucia from India with thirty-two cases of cholera on board, and that twenty-seven had died at St. Lucia. St. Lucia, which has the reputation of being the most insalubrious of the West India Islands, is about twenty-one miles from St. Vincent.

A Quebec despatch says: "The marine and fisheries agency here has just received two gas buoys, which, it is said, when charged, will burn continually night and day for three months, enabling vessels to distinguish proper channels in dangerous localities at all hours and in any weather. These buoys, the first of their kind ever imported into Canada, will be placed one in the Channel Patch in the Traverse, and the other on the Pilgrim's Shoal, as soon as possible to serve for the remainder of this season."

BAPTIST CHURCH.—The Rev. George Churchill, returned missionary from India, will preach to-morrow (Sunday) 14th inst., at the usual hours. Mr. Churchill will speak to the different congregations as follows during the coming week, viz.: North River on Monday evening; South Whitehall, Tuesday; Clyde River, Wednesday; St. Peter's Road, Thursday, and will be at Cavendish next Sunday, 21st inst. Mr. Churchill, with Mrs. C., who accompanies him, have been for some time laboring among the Talagus, and are now on a visit to this Province, and will no doubt be able to give interesting accounts of that remarkable people, where they have spent several years in missionary work. THE ARTILLERY COMPETITION

P. E. Island Ahead.

QUEBEC, Sept. 12. In the shooting match to-day the P. E. Island team won. The New Brunswick team were pretty close on them. The scores are not yet learned.

The Blockading Shanghai.

LONDON, Sept. 12. The Shanghai Chamber of Commerce telegraphs that the threatened blocking of the river by the Chinese excites strong indignation in that city. The Chamber has addressed a communication to the consuls and ministers of foreign powers there resident, urging them to prevent such action, and suggesting that Shanghai be made neutral. The Chamber requests the London committee to do everything possible in support of this suggestion.

A Substantial Victory.

CAIRO, Sept. 12. England has offered to guarantee a loan to the Egyptian Government if Egypt will place the Mosque property under English control as security. Later despatches confirm the report of the substantial victory of Mudir, of Dongala, at Ambakol over the Rebels from Kordofan.

Negotiations Revived.

PARIS, Sept. 12. La Patrie and La National, under reserve, give currency to a report that negotiations with China have been revived by France, tending to a peaceful settlement of all questions at issue.
