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Date Decided, Ottawa Reports Unofficially

OTTAWA, (CP) — The cabinet meets today to set the date for a general election, it will be Aug. 10, sources close to the government said Thursday night that the date—long predicted unofficially here—had been confirmed after arrival of Prime Minister St. Laurent from the Coronation.

Cabinet Changes?

One of the first things they will do, it was reported, is to take into the cabinet John W. Jack, Pickersill, political expert with Liberal leanings who now is \$15,000-a-year clerk of the Privy Council.

Senate Appointments

Along with the Aug. 10 date, it was believed, the Prime Minister will announce a number of appointments to the Senate and possibly other government appointments. It has been the custom to fill in vacancies before a general election, though it was not expected that the time of the 18 Senate openings will be filled.
