Irish National League Convention.

CHICAGO, Ill., Aug. 20. Judge Fitzgerald has been elected President of the Irish National League of America.

Mrs. Parnell, the agitator's mother, was received with tremendous enthusiasm, and was seated upon the platform.

Treasurer O'Reilly's report showed total receipts during the past year of \$328,000. It was suggested that five dollar collections be taken up all over the United States.

The Convention unanimously adopted a report endorsing Parnell, and pledging him its future support to whatever extent is found necessary. The report also expresses appreciation of the forbearance exhibited by the Irish people in their treatment of rack-renting landlordism and the partisan judicial system which prevails, especially in the north of Ireland. It acknowledges the efforts of Gladstone and the democracy of Great Britain to enact a measure calculated to bring about a reconciliation between two peoples who have so long been kept in a state of hostility by mis-government. It declares that Ireland has an inalienable right to self-government, acknowledges the obligations of the Irish race to the people and press of America, and records their warmest gratitude to the retiring officers of the League.

A Seizure in Island Waters.

HALIFAX, Aug. 20.

It is currently reported here that the Gloucester fishing schooner Druid has been seized at Malpeque, P. E. I., by the cruiser Houlette for not entering at the Custom House and for violation of the provisions of the Fishery Treaty of 1818, but was subsequently released by orders received from Capt. Scott, R. N.

The Druid hailed from Gloucester with a cargo of salt in barrels ostensibly for the Magdalen Islands, and put into Malpeque for "shelter." It is said that the Yankee skipper intended to tranship the cargoes of American fishermen when outside the three-mile limit and to supply them with salt and barrels.

A Warning to Liquor-drinkers.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Aug. 20.

Yesterday, Hatfield, who is a very handsome young man, was sentenced to imprisonment for life, under the verdict which found him guilty of rape. His mother, sisters and wife are heart-broken. Hatfield also completely broke down when sentence was passed upon him. The crime was committed whilst under the influence of liquor.

The Usual Ending.

MONTREAL, Aug. 20.

A young man named Fulda was arrested here yesterday and taken back to New York on a charge of stealing \$15,000 worth of diamonds from his employer. Fulda earned ten dollars per week, and lived at the rate of \$10,000 per year. His fall may be attributable to drink.

Magistrates "in a Fix."

BELFAST, Aug. 20.

A coroner's jury having brought in a verdict of "wilful murder" against nine policemen for unnecessarily firing upon citizens during the prevalence of the recent riots, the magistrates are at a loss to know what to do now, in case there should be any renewal of the rioting.

One Fool Still Lives—T'other Dead.

NIAGARA, Ont., Aug. 20.

Graham, the crank cooper, yesterday again successfully navigated the whirlpool rapids with his head protruding from his barrel. James Scott, a fisherman, attempted to swim the rapids in a cork suit yesterday. His dead body was picked up an hour later.

An Election for Haldimand.

OTTAWA, Aug. 20.

A writ has been issued for an election in the vacant Haldimand constituency. Nomination will be held on the first of September, and election will take place on the 8th same month.

West Indians Victorious.

MONTREAL, Aug. 20.

In the match here yesterday, the Wanderers' Cricket Club, of Halifax, N. S., were badly defeated by the West Indian team by a score of 123 runs and one innings to spare.

A Well Known Journalist Dead.

John Dougall, the well known proprietor of the Montreal Witness and the New York Witness, is dead, at the age of 78 years.
