Fourth Alberton Craft Is Seized

A lobster boat reportedly owned by Reg Fraser of Alberton South was seized at Alberton wharf Saturday morning by federal department of fisheries pro-

tection officers. The boat was taken in tow to an undisclosed port.

The night before a fishing dory and several hundred pounds of lobsters were seized on the shore a short distance from Alberton wharf.

It is understood charges will be laid against two Alberton South fishermen. This is the fourth Alberton district boat seized since the lobster season closed.

Sheep Killed Near Tignish

ALBERTON—Five lambs and two sheep on the farm of Russell Aylward at Skinner's Pond, near Tignish, were killed by dogs sometime last Friday.

Three other lambs, all six months old, were so badly mauled they had to be destroyed by the owner.

Two dogs were seen chasing the sheep early in the morning and they were run off by a fisherman on his way to the shore. They apparently returned later and worried the sheep to death.

The Alberton RCMP were notified and an attempt is being made to round up the dogs responsible before further damage is caused.

PONY TAUGHT 1,000 KIDDIES

WINDSOR, N.S. (CP)—Flash a 34-year-old pony that taught at least 1,000 Halifax children to ride, was retired with ceremony at the Haunts County Exhibition here Saturday night.

Flash has performed in the Canadian National Exhibition at Toronto, the New England Horse Show at Boston and hundreds of shows in the Atlantic provinces while a member of the famed Halifax Junior Bengal Lancers.

A memorial trophy for jumpers with the lancers has been established in his name.

In Saturday's ceremonies Flash, escorted by a guard of uniformed lancers, was paraded for the last time, stripped of his ceremonial tack, tied with a halter rope and a garland of roses strung over his back.

His retirement will be a green pasture near Halifax where the grass is up to his hocks.

Trading Blocs Seen Big Issue

LONDON (CP)—The impact of new European trading blocs is shaping up as a major topic for the two-day meeting of Commonwealth trade and finance ministers starting next Tuesday.

Government spokesmen here, inhibited by the general election campaign now in progress, have confirmed cautiously that ministers will study closely the moves toward closer economic associations in Europe.

The meeting is the first at the ministerial level of the Commonwealth economic consultative council set up by the Montreal conference one year ago to coordinate financial and economic discussions.

TWO CANADIANS

Canada will be represented by Finance Minister Fleming and Trade Minister Churchill, both of whom attended the Montreal conference.

Churchill now is on a tour through European countries. The chief object of his pre-meeting trip was said to be to study the arrangements worked out among European Common Market countries and the "Outer Seven" trading area.

The aim of both blocs is to reduce gradually tariff barriers among member countries.

Expectations are the ministerial meeting will provide some indication of how far the bigger Commonwealth countries have moved toward wanting a direct deal with the Common Market.

There have been reports that some Commonwealth members are prepared to trade away some of their British trading preferences in return for a guarantee of free access of their goods into Common Market countries.

Halifax Paper Wins Award

MONTREAL (CP)—The Halifax Chronicle-Herald and the Halifax Mail-Star have won an award for papers giving the best local support to a national advertising campaign.

The Sydney Post-Record trophy was presented Friday to Walter Browne, advertising manager for the Halifax newspapers, at the annual meeting of the Newspaper Advertising Managers Association of Eastern Canada.

R. A. Judges of The Montreal Star, a member of the association awards committee, said Sunday night the award was made on the basis of exhibits at the conference.

He said the Halifax papers showed a "unique approach." Advertisements of products by Maritime firms were backed by advertisements of local dealers handling the products. The advertising program received editorial backing in an attempt to boost Maritime industries.

Mr. Judges said "national" advertising—to men in the business—means advertisement of products by the firm that produces them. A national advertisement need not necessarily be carried in more than one city.

The presentation was made by John Muir, business manager of The Hamilton Spectator and president of the association.
