UIC Teams Plan To Handle Claims

In an effort to save time and improve the general efficiency of the service, the local office of the Unemployment Insurance Commission will next week send teams of workers from the Charlottetown office to four different island centres to assist fishermen, cannery workers and others in the preparation of seasonal claims for unemployment insurance.

Seasonal benefits begin during the first week of December. Most of the people involved in the proposed program are those receiving seasonal benefits. About 1,000 of these are fishermen.

In preparation for this work a number of extra employees have been taken on staff at the local office, and are receiving daily training by regular staff members.

STAFF TRAINING
J.B. Murley, manager of the UIC office states that with the many changes taking place in the act, daily training of the entire staff is a necessity.

M. Corrigan will head a team going to Rustico. The teams will remain from two to four days at each centre.

The plan was initiated last year and Mr. Murley reports that most satisfactory results were achieved. Previous to this, forms were mailed to the various applicants and quite often delays were experienced by improper filing of a claim.

Milton Area Taxpayers View Rural High School Problems

MILTON — Taxpayers from the school districts of Milton, Ebenezer, and Springvale met at Milton Nov. 11 to discuss the current rural high school project for that area. The case for the school was presented by Foster Hall of Hunter River, the chairman of the local committee which is sponsoring the project.

The meeting was well attended and continued until a late hour, because of the many questions asked and the variety of comments and suggestions made. As in previous meetings, Mr. Hall gave a short analysis of the problems facing rural districts in respect of higher education. His suggestion was that the removal of the higher grade from the one room schools to some central unit would make the provision of higher education possible and at the same time ease the burden of the multi-grade one room teacher.

There was no opposition to this suggestion in principle, and at this point a discussion of the problems faced by the teachers began. Their reluctance to accept certain schools, and the loss of teachers to the province each year was brought up, and while the teachers themselves were not criticised it was evident that the system under which they worked was held to be a major factor in their present discontent.

Turning again to the suggested grouping of the higher grades in the 31 districts which are the subjects of the scheme, it was pointed out how the present location of the schools made such a grouping possible. This area was ready made for such a rural unit with facilities for higher education.

Problems of capital cost, yearly operational expenditure and transport arrangements were considered. It was clear that, as in all the previous meetings, that finance was the chief concern of those present. A point brought out was the possibility of increased operating costs in future years due to inflation. The place and function of the one room school in this new grouping was also explained, and the system of administration that the new unit would require.

Mr. Hall made a plea for a new approach to the problem of rural education, not so much on the basis of finance, important though that factor must always be, but in terms of the needs of the country child in the new and demanding age into which he was growing up. It was becoming very clear that the uneducated child was at a great disadvantage and even the once considered simple trades that belonged to a rural economy are now requiring a more technical approach.

Despite the late hour there was no lack of interest when the meeting closed. Those present were asked to give the suggested plan
